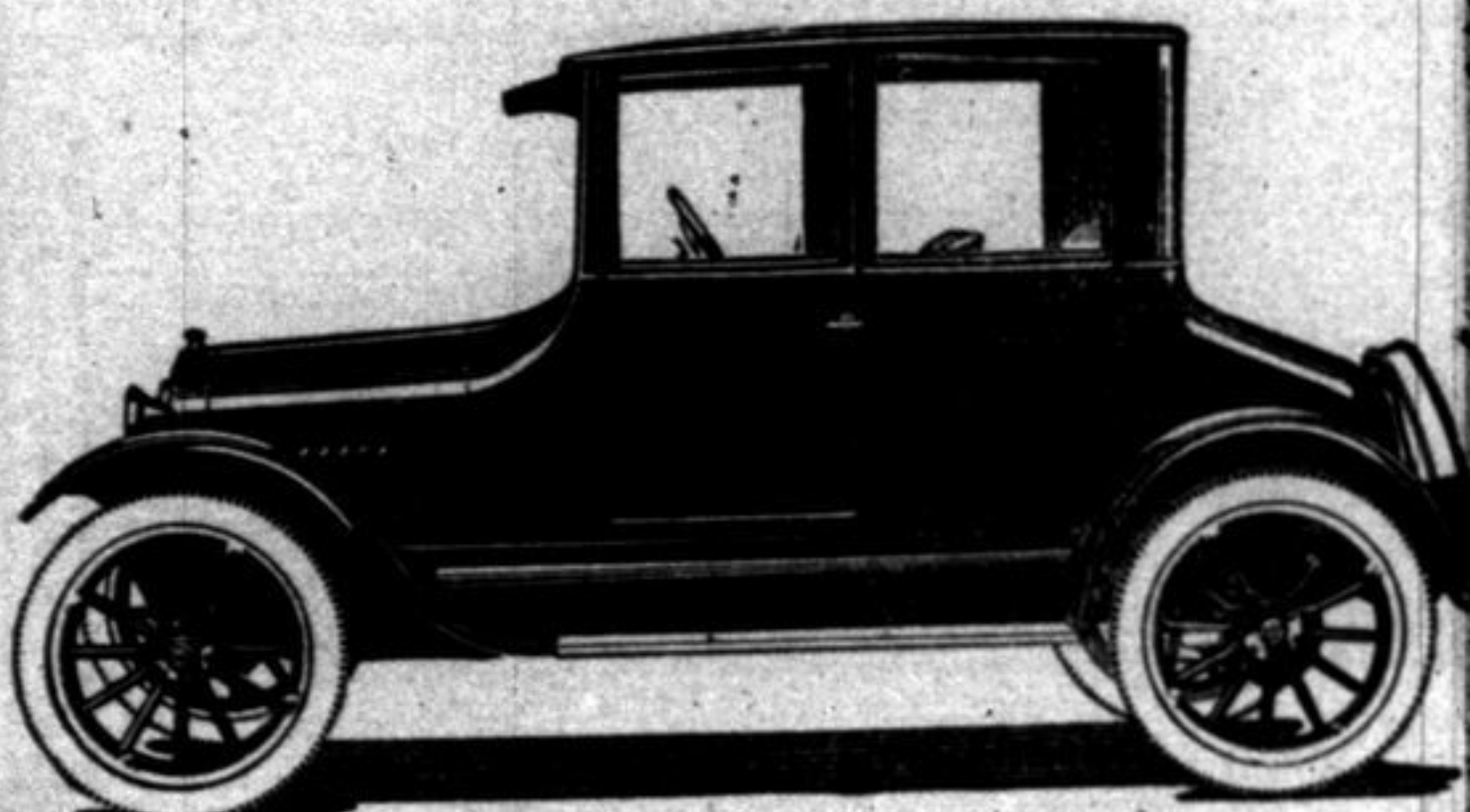

NEW VARIETIES OF ROSES AT EXHIBIT

"MUMS" TO BE FEATURE

Horticultural Experts to Show Latest Creations at Uptown Chicago Show to be Held Oct. 16-21

Peter Pearson, president of the Cook County Flower Growers association, has just announced that there will be placed on exhibition a new variety of roses and "mums," that will make their debut at the flower show, to be held in connection with the Uptown Chicago exposition, Broadway armory, October 16 to 21, both inclusive.

Mr. Pearson, who is chairman of the flower show committee has arranged with the America's greatest rosarian, E. G. Hill, of Richmond, Ind., to exhibit a vase of 100 of Hill's new "American" roses. These roses will not be placed on the market until 1923, and are reported to be a very large and beautiful and dark pink in color.

From the gardens of another great rosarian, A. N. Pearson, (not a relative of Peter Pearson) of Cromwell, Conn., will show the new "Commonwealth" rose. These roses will not be ready for the market until 1924. They are dark red.

Two nationally famous chrysanthemum hybridists (breeders of new varieties) will also exhibit at the Uptown Chicago exposition the latest 1922 novelties in "mums." The "mums" hybridists are Elmer D. Smith, of Adrian, Mich., and Charles H. Totty, of Madison, N. J. These exhibits, in addition to those of local breeders and growers, assure a flower show such as has never been shown in Chicago, before. It is common gossip among Chicago florists, that the Cook County Flower Growers association has given more publicity to the Uptown Chicago event than to the national convention of horticulturalists held in Kansas City several weeks ago. Chicago's northside district holds a warm spot in the hearts of retail florists and flower growers, because statistics prove that this district consumes, by an overwhelming majority, more flowers than any other district in Chicago. This district also has more fine flower shops and conservatories than any other in the city or vicinity.

HIGHWAY BONDS ARE SOLD TO ADVANTAGE

Six Million Dollars Worth Are Disposed of at Satisfactory Figures; Many Bidders

The department of public works and buildings of the state of Illinois has sold another auction sale on \$6,000,000 worth of state highway bonds. Col. C. R. Miller, director of the department of public works and buildings, presided at the sale and the sale was attended by the director of finance and representatives of all state officers.

These bonds brought the sum of \$5,981,300 plus accrued interest from May 1, 1922, which represents a rate of approximately \$99.69. The interest yield on the bonds at this figure would be approximately 4.04 per cent. The bonds draw interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum and are due \$500,000 annually from May 1, 1929 to May 1, 1940 inclusive. There were six groups bidding representing 42 of the largest financial concerns of the country. The successful bidder was a group composed of Wm. R. Compton company, Chicago, Dillon-Reed & Company, Chicago, and Halsey-Stuart & Company, Chicago. Their bid was the 35th auction bid submitted.

The price received today is considerably more favorable than that received at the second sale of \$6,000,000 held on April 13, 1922 at which the bonds brought \$98.875 representing a yield of 4.11 per cent. The first bond sale of \$5,000,000 which was held on Tuesday, October 25, 1921, resulted in a price at \$94.02 or an interest rate of approximately 4.85 per cent.

These figures indicate the steady rise of the bond market, and in each case the prices secured have been most satisfactory the department states.

FARM-LAND BOUGHT BY CHICAGO DOCTOR

Two Pieces of Property in This Vicinity Sold at Master's Sale at Waukegan

Master-in-chancery M. Runyard, on Friday at Waukegan, auctioned off a fine farm south of Highland Park and it brought \$27,250.00 the bidding being spirited. The purchaser is Dr. O. L. Mitchell, and it was sold to settle a suit pending between Lillian M. Warren versus Henry Freie. The property consists of 40 acres southwest of Highland Park, heavily wooded, and beautiful home site, and 80 acres southwest of Deerfield in Cook county. The purchaser lives in Chicago.

THE MOVE IS NATION-WIDE

Children to Assist in Plan of National Memorial for Wounded World-War Veterans

America's school children are to enter into the plans for national forget me not day Saturday, November 4, for the disabled and wounded American veterans of the world war, according to announcement by C. Hamilton Cook, national commander of the Disabled American Veterans of the world war. Captain Cook, who has just arrived at national headquarters of the Disabled Veterans after a tour of the eastern states, reports keen interest in the forget me not movement on the part of hundreds of schools in many cities and towns. School principals and teachers have secured the co-operation of the children in the great national activity of making the forget me nots from paper and other materials; and turning over the results of their efforts to the local committees arranging for the November 4 "day." One-half hour or an hour each week is devoted by the children to the making of the little artificial flowers that are to be sold as "forget me not day" favors throughout the United States Saturday November 4.

NEW ROAD MAP OF LAKE COUNTY MADE

Prepared in Office of County Highway Superintendent For Motorists

Lake county is to have a new road map. A comprehensive one made in the office of Highway Superintendent Russell, at the county seat, has been sent to Rand, McNally Co., Chicago, to be published for the use of motorists who frequent the North Shore. The map was made at the request of the publishing company in order that a down-to-date map of all the new roads, cement and other types might be available.

AMERICAN LEGION FOR GREAT LAKES

Lake County Post Backing Plan To Rehabilitate Station; Asks Support

The Lake County American Legion this week went on record in favor of preparedness and voted to support the movement being launched by North Shore organizations to have the Great Lakes Naval Training station restored to something like pre-war condition.

The Legion post, at a meeting Monday evening in Waukegan, decided to transmit a resolution to all Legion posts in the state requesting them to back the plan to rehabilitate the training station. At present there are probably less than 700 men in the station, all in trade schools, and there is danger that the station may be still further reduced, if not closed altogether, through alleged political machinations in favor of Atlantic seaboard stations.

Three hundred happy children of the Deaconess orphanage at Lake Bluff greatly enjoyed the Harvest Home festival at the orphanage at Lake Bluff last Friday, and there were many guests who also were delighted with the excellent program and special exercises in which the children participated. Dr. E. S. Tittle of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Evanston, made the principal address, explaining the work and purpose of the orphanage.

The home was opened to the visitors who inspected its several departments with interest and found everything in excellent condition, and the children well cared for. Many of the guests brought donations of essential things to supply the needs of the home. A good luncheon was served at 12:30, at which the visitors were guests.

NEW EQUIPMENT ON NORTHWESTERN ROAD

Number of New Steel Coaches and Pullmans Received; Where Used

The Chicago & Northwestern Railway has just received and will place in service at once a number of new steel coaches and new steel Pullman sleeping cars of the latest type.

The new steel coach equipment is to be placed in service on four trains operating between Chicago and Milwaukee, on two trains operating between Chicago and Lake Geneva, on two trains operating between Chicago and Freeport, Ill.

The Rochester-Minnesota Special, operating between Chicago, Rochester and Mankato, Minn., will consist of entirely new equipment, including new all-steel baggage cars.
