### URGES SAVING OF GRASS LAKE LOTUS

IS PREY OF AVARICIOUS

Illinois University Woman in Plea for Preservation of the Rare Native Flower

Commercialization of the lotus in Grass Lake, in the northwestern part of Lake County, has given rise to a protest by Mary Elizabeth Aleshire of the University of Illinois, writing in the current number of the official organ of the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs.

"This commercialization of one of the rarest of our native flowers," Miss Aleshire writes, "has reached alarming proportions. It threatens to render these rare blooms extinct within a very short time."

"Grass Lake," the writer suggests, "offers the best home for the permanent abode of this one of our loveliest of native American plants." Its heavy green leaves lie flat upon the water, and grow to several feet in diameter. The pale yellow flowers are from one-third to one and one-half inches broad and are cupped in the center. The tubers and seeds are edible.

### Ruthless Destruction

"It is with regret to those who cherish this form of native beauty that we see thoughtless persons ruthlessly destroying large portions of the blossoming beds, but it is unpardonable to see the ripened pods gathered for commercial purposes. This commercialization of one of the rarest of our native flowers has reached alarming proportions. It threatens to render these rare blossoms extinct in a very short time."

Miss Aleshire urges the passage of a drastic law to protect these beds of lotus. She declares it is the purpose of the art extension committee of the preservation of this beauty spot as one link in its general plan "to so promote an interest in the native beauty of the state that our citizenry may enjoy it, and preserve its values for the blessings of future generations."
