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BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Circuit Court Docket Crowded With Cases; Hunter Killed; Salary Increase Voted County Officers

There are more than 300 cases on the October docket of the Lake county circuit court which will be kept busy practically every day of the term. In addition to the large number of common law and chancery cases there will be a large number of criminal cases which will come before the grand jury, as State's Attorney A. V. Smith has had a large number of cases for grand jury investigation. Many of these are justice court matters and in a large number of instances there will be indictments.

Oliver, the 20 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Richardson, of Round Lake, accidentally shot himself while hunting at McHenry last week. It is reported that the young man stumbled and fell and was instantly killed.

The Lake county board of Supervisors has authorized the payment of a \$1000 reward to two Kenosha men who furnished information which led to the arrest and conviction of Ignatz Potz, who is now serving time in Joliet, for the murder of a motorcycle policeman at Winthrop Harbor.

According to Paule, who is now serving time at the Lake county jail on a charge of having sold intoxicating liquor at his Fourth Lake resort, he has announced his intention of selling his interests at that point to Chicago negroes who wish to make the place an exclusive summer resort for colored folks.

Waukegan's epidemic of Flu appears to be getting worse instead of better, judging by the scores of new cases that are developing daily. The most hopeful feature is that the disease is much lighter than its other visits here. Hundreds are having troubles with coughs, cold in the head.

John Proski, 29 years old, a shell-shock victim undergoing treatment in the Great Lakes Naval Training station hospital was prevented from committing suicide by hanging in a cell of the city jail at Waukegan when he was cut down by a police officer. Proski had removed his belt placed it about his neck and tied the loose

end to one end of the bars that form the ceiling of his cell.

The board of supervisors has voted to change the method of keeping accounts at the Lake County General hospital, following a report submitted by the hospital committee, the principal object in making the change being to eliminate some of the expenses connected with the present system. It was found that under the new plan a saving of \$1,800 a year can be made in the cost of bookkeeping.

As the result of action taken by the county board the salaries of County Clerk Lew Hendee and County Treasurer Roy Bracher will be raised from \$3,000 to \$3,500 per year. The salaries of the new probate judge and probate clerk were fixed at \$2800 a year. The salaries of County Judge Persons and Circuit Clerk Lew Brockway were left at \$3,000.

The board also voted to pay to Doc Brown, former county physician, the \$750 which he claimed was due him.

4 COLLEGE BENEFITS HELD AT EVANSTON

Petticoat Lane Committee Plans Interesting Entertainment In November

The publicity committee for Petticoat Lane, the four college benefit to be given in November by the alumnae of Goucher, Vassar, Wellesley and Wells, is devising a variety of schemes to bring the affair before the public. Several thousand piquant little "stickers" are provided to adorn the correspondence of all loyal supporters of the bazaar. The gay four-color design sketched by Mrs. Frank C. Dakin is a quaint little figure in full skirt, holding two huge colonial bouquets, with the name "Petticoat Lane," below; surrounding it are the names of the four colleges.

More than 3500 stickers have already been sold, the proceeds going to swell the Petticoat Lane total. The committee now plans to arrange for automobile stickers of the same design. Mrs. Fenton Kelsey, Mrs. James Madison Stiffer, Miss Sarah Bennet and Mrs. Frank W. Kingsley are in charge of the sales. The work of the publicity committee also includes placarding the north shore with hand-drawn posters, arranged by Mrs. Charles F. Hemenway, and the mailing of several thousand announcement cards, to the alumnae of other women's colleges, society and club women, for which Mrs. Fenton Kelsey is responsible.
