RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Reports of Year's Work Heard  
And Officers and Department Superintendents Are Appointed

In addition to the report of the annual election of officers of the Lake county W. C. T. U., printed in this paper last week, there is given here with a more comprehensive account of the proceedings of the session, including resolutions adopted and superintendents of departments appointed:

Reports on the year's work were read by Mrs. Tibbets, of Lake Forest president of the county union, and the presidents of the local unions also submitted their reports, most of which showed increase in membership, good financial support, and much accomplished for the cause. The county report showed a neat balance in the treasurer.

Miss Mary Polmoteer, county probation officer, gave a report of her work at the afternoon session Thursday. She declared that the support of the union is a great aid to her work by decreasing poverty, and improving home conditions, which naturally make probation work lighter. She appealed to the union members to co-operate with her in the work.

**Resolutions Adopted**

The following resolutions were presented and adopted by the convention with out a dissenting vote.

"With unbounded reverence and love we acknowledge the constant care and guidance of our Heavenly Father during the past year. Because of His mercy, we, the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Lake county, rejoice that we have been permitted to assemble in this, our annual convention; and be it hereby

"Resolved, That we pledge ourselves anew to the principles of our organization; and that, with a knowledge of the need of our government has for whole-hearted service, we pledge ourselves to give the best we have to offer to our country.

"Resolved, That we endorse the work being done by our juvenile probation officer, Miss Mary Polmoteer, and we greatly deplore any efforts that would tend to lessen the efficiency of the work of the juvenile work of Lake county.

"Resolved, That we endorse the work of Lake county.

"Resolved, That we hereby express to the White Ribboners of Waukegan our thanks and appreciation for all their efforts in so carefully arranging for our reception and entertainment while here; to all who have given of their talent for our enjoyment; and to all who in any way have contributed to the pleasure and profit of this splendid convention; especially for the beautiful ferns and flowers; and to the trustees of the church for the use of their building.

**BOARD TO OBTAIN  
WAR HEROES LIST**

COMMITTEE IS NAMED

Supervisors Move to Secure All Ex-Service Men's Names for Tablet in the County Memorial Hospital

The Lake County board of supervisors has taken decisive action to obtain a complete list of all the service men of Lake county who participated in the world war, and the chairman was authorized to name a committee of five, which will take up the matter immediately with all the members of the board to get the names, which will be placed on a bronze tablet in Victory Memorial hospital, a county institution.

There are already 4,000 names on the service roll but it is believed the total number of those who served in the war will reach 4,500 and the board members and committee will co-operate with the Legion posts of the county to obtain the additional names and records.

**To Tabulate Names**

The work of the committee will be to tabulate the names as they come in from the various townships and to keep the supervisors busy, as the time is getting short, it being planned to have all the names in within the next two weeks.

The supervisors received a communication from Judge Claire C. Edwards, general chairman of the hospital committee, and the board voted to include the \$20,000 appropriated at a former meeting, in the county budget so that the money, which has not been needed until now, will be available, as the hospital is nearing completion.
