MRS. HUNT, PIANIST, OPENS CLASSES HERE

Former Resident Is Associated With Hamilton Institute of Chicago

Mrs. Emily Parsons Hunt, pianist, well known socially and professionally in Chicago and on the north shore, has recently become associated with the Fra Hamilton studios of Chicago and Evanston and she is teaching Tuesday and Friday afternoons at the home of Mrs. Henry Sellers, Jr., in Ravinia.

Mrs. Hunt brings to the studio the fruits of a comprehensive and varied experience. As Emily Parsons she was known as one of the most gifted of Chicago's younger pianists, playing an extended concert tour with Max Bendix (former concert master and assistant conductor of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, and having successful concert appearances together with Maude Powell and many other famous artists. She has had years of valuable studio experience playing repertoire for George Hamlin and other noted singers here and abroad.

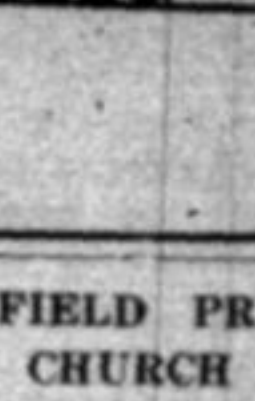
