She has had years of valuable studio experience playing repertoire for George Hamlin and ther noted singers here and abroad.

Following her concert appearances during five years she occupied the post of director of the music department of Rockford college where she made brilliant record as teacher and executive. During this period Mrs. Hunt also taught in the Regina Watson studio in Chicago-one long recognized in both America and Europe as main taining the most elevated standard of musicianship. 
