**Cootie Party**

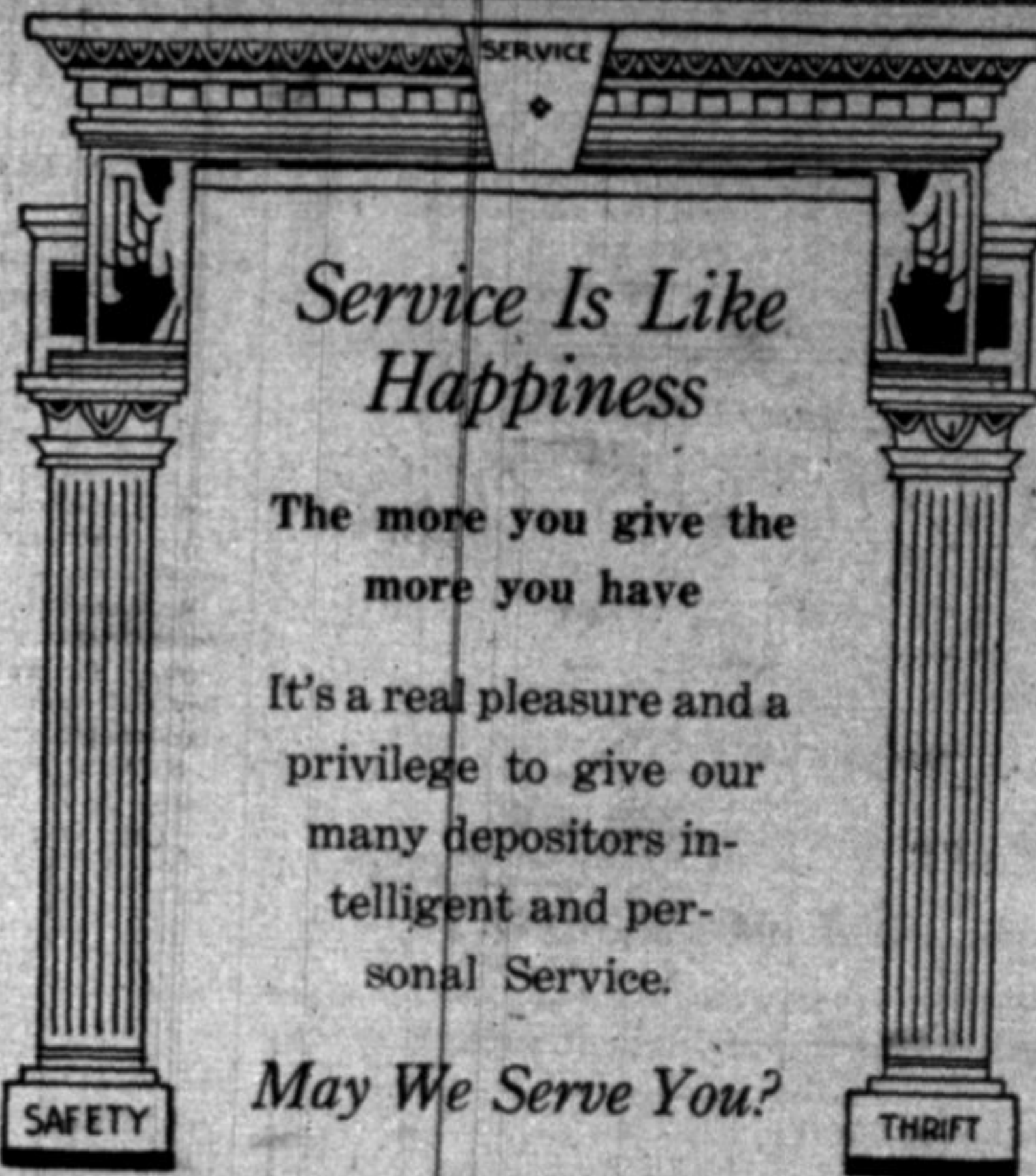
