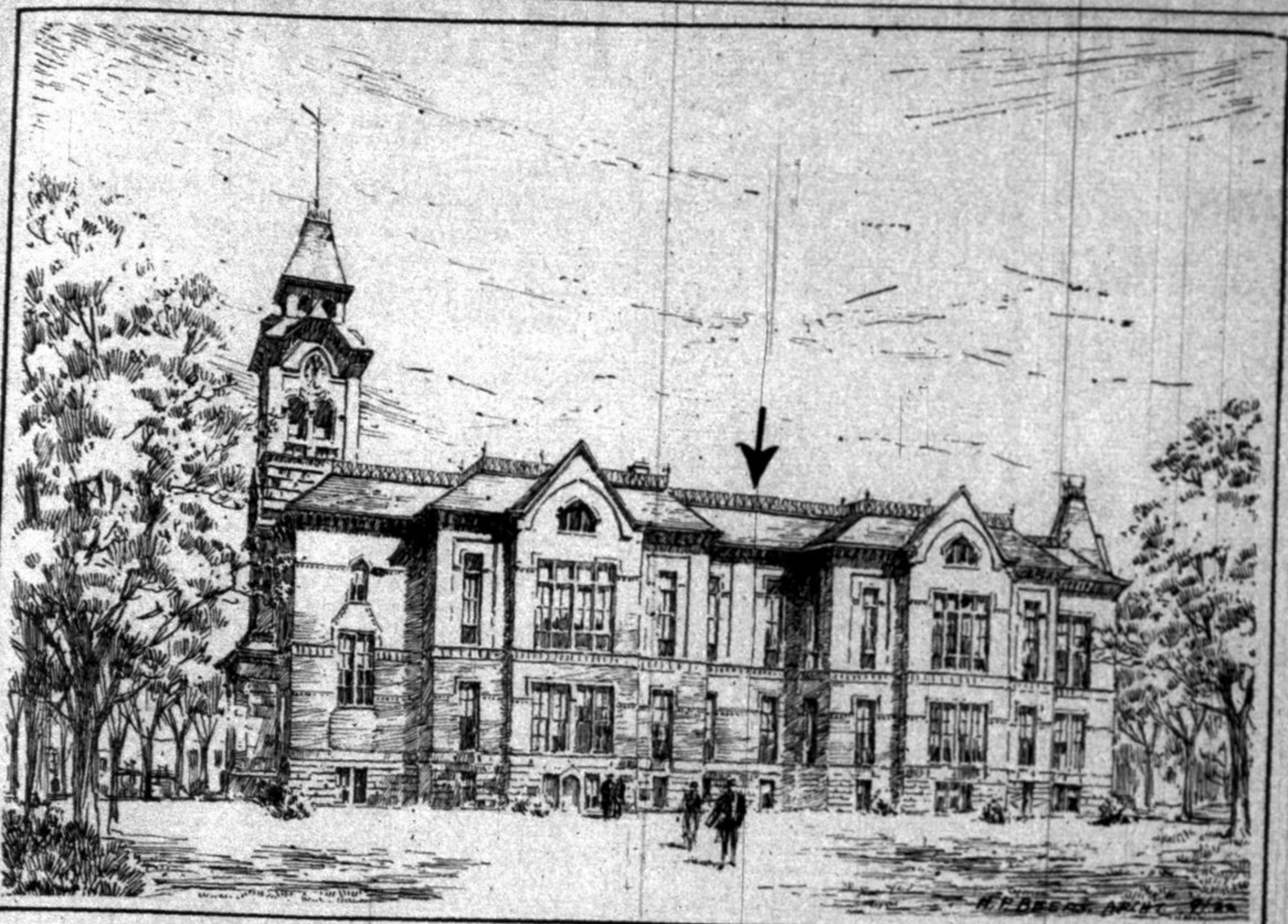


HOW REMODELED COURT HOUSE WILL LOOK

Contagious Diseases in Waukegan Increase; Effort to Obtain Slayer's Pardon May Succeed

Waukegan health officials report a number of cases of typhoid, diphtheria and chickenpox.

Although reports from other cities are that the hard and soft coal supplies will be adequate and the price probably lower, owing to the fact that freight rates have been considerably reduced on coal, Waukegan dealers are waiting until coal arrives on the docks and a price is set by the wholesalers.

Effort is being made to secure former Senator Beveridge of Indiana as principal speaker at the annual meeting of the Lake County Bar Association at Glen Flora, October 24.

Efforts of relatives and sentiment-alists to secure a pardon for George Niggemeyer formerly of Fox Lake, in the penitentiary under a 25-year sentence for murder of John L. Johnson are believed to have been defeated by the presentation to the board of pardons of a petition signed by the 12 jurymen who found Niggemeyer guilty, stating that the crime was an unusually brutal one and declaring that it would be a mistake to pardon the man.

Prevention of hasty marriages by publishing the banns three weeks before the ceremony and health examinations of all couples about to wed are being urged by the social service department of the Episcopal Church of this diocese.

An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed last week in the Federal Court in Chicago, against John A. Strang, Wadsworth, who was at one time known as the millionaire cattle king of Lake County.

Judge Edward Shurtleff, Marengo, of the Seventh judicial circuit, has been appointed to serve as appellate judge for the Third district, it was announced by the state supreme court at Springfield.

Judge Thomas M. Hett, Hillsboro, of the Fourth judicial circuit, has been selected to serve as judge of the appellate court of the Second district.

These men have been chosen to fill the remainder of terms left vacant by death.

COAL SITUATION IS NOT SERIOUS

NATIONAL BUREAU REPORT

Finds Middle West Not Likely to Suffer as Supply is Available Except in Few Instances

The coal situation in the middle west is not as serious as preliminary predictions made proclaimed the National Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce announces following a complete survey of conditions of the

states east of the Mississippi river and north of the Ohio river.

These facts garnered from the various bureaus in the surveyed regions are included in the report.

That there are practically no supplies in the hands of local dealers.

That public utilities have at least an average of 45 days coal on hand. That by product coke plants are well supplied.

That steel works are fairly well supplied.

That industries have about a 45 days' supply.

That the bituminous situation is becoming easier.

That the present prices are not

being complained about.

That the first cold weather will be the most critical period.

The middle west is in the most critical condition, the report continues, but it is not predicted that there will be any acute suffering in this territory.

Lake County, although in not as serious condition as the general report through the middle west shows, will experience some difficulty in getting all the coal that is needed.
