Wife of Mayor Passes Away Sunday in Chicago; Highly Esteemed; Sympathy Expressed

Flags drooping at half-mast on the city building and at Central and St. John's avenues Monday morning brought, with a shock of sorrow to all Highland Park, the sad news that Mrs. Jeanette Hastings, wife of Mayor Samuel M. Hastings, had passed away quite suddenly Sunday in Chicago.

It was generally known that Mrs. Hastings had been in ill health for some time, but friends expected no serious result and grief at her loss and sympathy for the bereaved mayor and his son and family was everywhere felt and expressed.

Born in Illinois Mrs. Hastings was formerly Miss Jeanette Rankin and was born at Hinckley, DeKalb county. The Hastings family have lived in Highland Park about 15 years and previously about the same length of time in Chicago.

Other near relatives are three brothers and two sisters, Thomas Rankin of Lake Bluff, Donald Rankin of Saugatuck, Mich., John Rankin of New York; Mrs. Joseph Schenk of Braidwood, Ill., and a sister in California.

Had Many Friends Mrs. Hastings was highly esteemed by a host of friends in Highland Park and elsewhere on the North Shore and in Chicago, because of her many fine qualities and sterling worth.

Funeral Tuesday The funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon at the family residence, the Rev. Frank Pitt officiating, and there was a large attendance including representatives from the several city departments.
