THEATRE GUILD TO OPEN NEXT MONTH
North Shore Dramatic Organization Planning Many Fine Features

The North Shore Theatre Guild, which so successfully presented a number of plays on the north shore last year, will open its second season with Barrie's "Dear Brutus" to be presented early in November, according to announcements this week. The cast is now open for new talent, both amateur and professional, it is understood.

The play was secured from Charles Frohman, Inc., with difficulty, and at a considerable expense. It is to be played along the north shore, and the cast will include several well-known Evanston people, among them Mrs. Ralph Heilman, Miss Margaret Fabian, E. Lyman Jr., and Dr. Oliver Farnsworth. Others in the cast will be resident amateurs from Lake Forest, Highland Park, Glencoe, Winnetka, Kenilworth, and Wilmette. The play is being produced by Raymond O'Neil, who was formerly the director of the Little Theatre of Cleveland.

Beginning this season the guild will give one revival of a standard play, the remaining three productions to be of plays new to Chicago and vicinity. According to announcements, the guild is also eager to secure plays of native authorship, and invites local writers to submit manuscripts for consideration.
