ELECTION TUESDAY; VOTE BOND ISSUE

PUBLIC POLICY PROJECTS

State Bonus and Light Wines and Beer on Ballot; State and County Officers to Be Elected

Tuesday, Nov. 7, is general election day, on which the voters of Illinois will cast ballots for their choice of state and county officers.

Besides the regular candidates to be voted for, there are three questions of public policy on separate ballots.

Court House Addition

Lake county voters are urged to get out on election day and vote favorably on this bond issue plan.

A meeting of heads of women's organizations throughout the county was held Wednesday in Waukegan to discuss the bond issue plan.

Other Questions

Two other questions of public policy to be voted on by the state at large appear on a separate ballot.

State and County Candidates

Officers to be elected on the state ticket are state treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, three trustees of the state university, two congressmen at large.

In the Eighth Senatorial district three representatives in the general assembly are to be elected.

The county ticket, Republican county ticket has no opposition, but some votes must be cast for each candidate.

For county judge—Perry L. Persons. For County clerk—Lew A. Hendee. For probate judge—Martin C. Decker.

SUNDAY NIGHT BLAZE HALTED BY FIREMEN

DAMAGE IS ABOUT \$3,500.00

Fire of Unknown Origin Causes Considerable Loss in Pratt Building; Neighboring Depts. Called

Fire of unknown origin broke out about 9 o'clock Sunday night in an air shaft between the Hawkins and Pratt buildings on St. John's avenue and damaged the Pratt building probably to the extent of \$1,000.

The alarm was sounded by operators in the telephone office, across the alley from the Pratt building. The operators called the fire station and the same time Night Patrolman Rafferty also noticed the smoke issuing from the roof of the building and started an investigation.

Notwithstanding that smoke filled the phone exchange, the plucky operators remained at their posts, sounding the alarm and answering inquiries. The building they were in was at no time threatened by the fire.

The firemen soon had two leads of hose working, one direct from a plug and the other through the pumper. Suddenly the pump broke down, and as the fire looked dangerous, it was decided to take no chances and call for help were sent to Lake Forest, Fort Sheridan and Highwood.

By the time the firemen arrived, which was but a few minutes, and 30 out of the 11 men were on the job, the flames had burst through the roof in places, and it looked as though the entire block was threatened.

Insurance adjusters were on the ground Monday, but it was explained that it would be several days before exact figures could be furnished regarding the damage done.

The loss from fire on the Pratt building is probably about \$1,000; water and smoke damage will increase this considerably, probably another \$1,000.

On the first floor the Pratt cigar store is considerably damaged by water and smoke. The Chris Neibur grocery suffered some damage to stock in the basement.

On the second floor the Pat Hamdan tailor shop suffered considerably. There was slight damage from smoke and water in the offices of Drs. G. Q. Grady, C. H. Lanphere, J. Fitzgerald, Morley McNeill and Dr. Bat-chelder's Beauty Parlor.

Much credit is given the firemen for their prompt response and effective handling of the situation which probably saved the entire block from a bad scorching.

How the fire started is not known, but from the appearance of it it probably originated in the air shaft at the end of the hall on the second floor, the flames entering the building through a window in a lavatory at the end of the hall which window opens on the shaft.

That the fire did not start in the lavatory is indicated by the fact that its walls are not burned or blackened below the level of the window sill, but are badly burned above that line.

A cigaret stub thrown into the shaft or a spark from a neighboring fire may have ignited rubbish and caused the blaze in the shaft, firemen believe.
