PRESIDENT ISSUES THANKSGIVING CALL

Proclamation Sets Aside Nov. 30 as Official Date for Giving Thanks

A proclamation calling on all citizens to observe Thursday, Nov. 30, as Thanksgiving Day was issued by President Harding last Thursday. The president said that Thanksgiving Day, established by "the devout fathers" to give thanks for the "bounties and protection which Divine Providence had extended throughout the year" had come to be to him the "most characteristic of our national observances."

"The year, which now approaches its end, has been marked, in the experience of our nation, by a complexity of trials and of triumphs, of difficulties and of achievements, which we must regard as our inevitable portion in such an epoch as that through which all mankind is moving," the president said.

"As we survey the experience of the passing twelve months we shall find that our estate presents very much to justify a nation-wide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed upon coal famine."
