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BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS
Ku Klux Donates \$100 to the Salvation Army; North Chicago Alderman In Jail

The Ku Klux Klan has contributed \$100 to the Salvation Army for charitable work in Waukegan, it is reported. The organization, is said to have a membership of 450 in that city.

The Elite Theater in Waukegan, which has been conducted by Carl Muller for the last ten years, has been purchased by Edward Trinz, associated with Lubliner and Trinz, who control eighteen theatres in Chicago.

Robert Graves is in the Oak Park hospital suffering from two scalp wounds and Joe Oltean is in the Lake county jail under bonds of \$5,000 and charged with assault with a deadly weapon as the result of a section gang fight at Lake Villa last week. Graves will recover.

One North Chicago alderman and five others, one a woman, were committed to the Lake county jail last week when they appeared before Judge P. L. Parsons in county court and pleaded guilty to charges of having violated the prohibition law.

With success of several races held in Michigan City by sail boat crews of members of the naval reserve indications are that a similar sport will be tried at Waukegan during the spring if arrangements can be made to secure the proper sails for the cutters that have been detailed to the Waukegan establishment.

"The City of Waukegan" is the name of the fine new steamship which is being built for the Hill Steamboat line and which will be placed in operation between Kenosha, Waukegan and Chicago by the first part of December. It will replace the Steamer McVea which is making the run at the present time.

While excavating for the new summer home of Mrs. W. H. Gifford at Channel Lake, the workmen dug up eight Indian skeletons from a mound. They were about four feet from the surface and each grave was marked with a large stone and smaller ones around the grave. The stones seemed to be placed on a level with the body.

Only one good head was saved as the others had fallen apart. Mr. Gifford took the head to Chicago and presented it to the Presbyterian hospital.

ADMIRAL RODMAN DENIES REPORTS
Chindblom Gets Telegram From Officer Refuting Great Lakes Story

A group of members of the "Save Great Lakes" committee visited the naval training station last week and made an inspection of the grounds and buildings.

The data gathered will be used in a report to congress and will be one of the many arguments to be used toward retaining the station as a training center for naval recruits in this district.

The committee was composed of David L. Goodwillie, chairman, Edward F. Dodge, Capt. Myron Adams, Harry Eugene Kelley, chairman of the Union League committee an public affairs; John Benham, W. L. Berry, Congressman Carl E. Chindblom and William L. Hall.

Congressman Chindblom announced he had received a telegram from Admiral Hugh Rodman, chairman of the naval commission, making a flat denial of reports he had "ever stated officially or otherwise that the Great Lakes training station should be abandoned."

COUNTRY ESTATE IS SOLD FOR \$120,000.00
