ASK \$45,000 FUND FOR RAVINIA PARK TO MAINTAIN THE OPERA

North Shore Communities Are Being Urged to Aid This Artistic Project so Widely Known

Decision of the Highland Park Business Men's association last week to contribute \$200 a year for a period of five years to the support of Ravinia Park is part of a general movement to secure co-operation of North Shore communities in backing this notable summer opera project.
Forty-five thousand dollars is to be Ravinia's guarantee for the season of 1923, it is announced. The project which furnishes only the best art from the musical world, has been sponsored for the past ten years by Mr. Louis Eckstein, but next year it is planned that all North Shore towns shall provide a number of guarantors.
The Ravinia club is trying to interest all North Shore towns in the guarantee fund. The past season at Ravinia was a brilliant one, and the season of 1923 will be an even greater success artistically, it is anticipated.

Internationally Known
"Ravinia means much to Chicago and this community," said Mr. Jarvie of Evanston, in commenting on the plan recently. "It means much to the North Shore, and today its reputation is not local, but national and even international. In the great music centers of Europe, Ravinia is well known, and perhaps in those art centers it is even better appreciated than it is here, for Europe knows the benefits accruing from an institution of this kind, and Europe also understands the Herculean efforts that must be brought to bear to make such an institution successful.

Artistic Success
"And Ravinia is successful—successful in the highest sense of the word, for it serves to foster an understanding and an appreciation of lyric drama, one of the highest of the art forms, and its structure is reared upon a foundation of altruism. From the commercial standpoint, Ravinia is not successful. It is not a commercial enterprise. No thought of money making or the accumulation of additional wealth through this means has ever entered the mind of Mr. Eckstein. Alone he has borne the brunt of the burden year after year. The deficit he has met is big, and yet he has persevered, promoting art for art's sake."

MAKING LIFE TOO EASY
Visitor From Austria Declares Americans Too Comfortable For Vigorous Progress and Achievement

Shall we discard our rocking-chairs? Are Americans the only race that continually seek ease when sitting down? Mr. Joseph Urban says that in Austria the rocking-chair is practically unknown. Mr. Urban is the designer and stage-craftsman who bought the Wiener Werkstatte from Vienna to America, and who installed the Werkstatte's fascinating exhibit, recently shown at the Art Institute.
"Yes," said Mr. Urban, "in our country, even when we sit down, it is for a purpose; either to work or to partake of our meals. A bench or a stool therefore, is all we need. We have no time to spend in rocking chairs."
Lack Individuality
What I have observed in my eight years' residence in your country is that America needs more individuality, especially artistic individuality. A man's home is of supreme importance and it should express the taste of the man. I have seen hundreds of houses all built alike. Look inside and you see the same rugs, the same furniture, the same chandeliers, the same wall paper, even the same rocking chairs. Ugly! All individuality all self-expression is killed.

It costs only a little more to change the plan of the house so that it is a little different from others and it is easy enough to choose light, colorful wall papers instead of dark browns and dark greens. If one cannot afford to alter the whole interior let a corner of the room to be chosen and there erect a shrine of beauty. It is possible to so arrange a room and the entire interior of a home, that it will be a pleasure to enter it and to remain surrounded by a delightful "atmosphere."
