Two-Year-Old Son Geo. Bowden Complete Copy of Sacred Lodge of the Blackfeet Set up on School Grounds Is Unique

> The long-looked-for Indian tepee in which the Elm Place pupils have been investing some of their spare savings arrived Tuesday of last week. It had made the long trip from Glacier Park Montana, by freight. The cover and the "back rests" came in a box. the nineteen tall, straight tepee poles 24 feet long, were simply wired to gether. Each pole was a single lodge-pole pine tree and was cut and

The following morning the tepec with its painted cover attracted much attention and effectively advertised Mr. Loring's lecture.

The original lodge is owned by Boy Chief, a Blackfoot Indian seventy years of age, who oc cupied it with his family during th past summer while it was set up near Glacier Park station. Mr. Jesse Smith planned the purchase of tepee for the school while on a vacation trip to Glacier Park and secured the co-operation of skilled Indians in its construction.
