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### PROPOSED NEW CONSTITUTION

In this paper is printed an extensive questionnaire regarding the proposed new state constitution, to be voted on by the people of Illinois on Dec. 12. The publicity committee of the Constitutional Convention has endeavored to make this series of questions and answers cover every possible point regarding which there may be misunderstanding in connection with the proposed new basic law of the state and the careful perusal of the questionnaire is urged in order that all may be prepared to vote intelligently on the question on Dec. 12. The new constitution is not perfect. Its framers admit that, because many of its sections are the result of compromise between opposing factions and largely between the respective of Chicago and downstate interests. But, it is believed that the new document is a notable improvement over the old constitution, and as such is recommended to the serious consideration of the electorate.
