### HOSPITAL AUXILIARY HAS ALL DAY MEETING

More Workers Needed; Plan a "Memorial Flower Fund"

Wednesday of last week the Woman's Auxiliary of the Highland Park Hospital held a meeting at Trinity Parish House. By ten o'clock a large number of women were at work and before noon forty-four were busy making dressings and sewing.

Mrs. Samspeil, chairman of the surgical dressings for the hospital announced that enough dressings had been made to last two weeks. Mrs. Campbell asked that all women make a special effort to be present at the next meeting. If thirty or forty of the women who used to work for the Red Cross during the war would give one day a month the hospital could be kept supplied with the necessary gauze dressing. The war is over but these supplies are constantly needed right here in Highland Park and surely the work is worth while.

The sewing in charge of Mrs. McWhinney is in need of workers too. Sixty abdominal bandages were made and thirty surgical towels were hemmed. There is machine sewing to be done, also a large amount of basting and all women are urged to help.

At noon a delicious luncheon was served by Mrs. G. A. Mason, her co-chairman, Mrs. Eisenstaedt, and a committee. Then a business meeting was held, Mrs. Gerard Van Schaick, chairman of the Women's Auxiliary, presiding. Mrs. Van Schaick announces five new directors for the Hospital Auxiliary. She spoke of a poor woman needing care at the hospital and it was voted to pay all expenses in connection with the case.

Also a "Memorial Flower Fund" and a "Happy Day Fund" were decided upon. When one loses a friend it is customary to send flowers and such quantities are often received that there is literally nothing to do with them but throw them out. The "Memorial Flower Fund" means that one wishing to send a remembrance to a bereaved family can send a check to this hospital "Memorial Flower Fund," a card will be sent the family telling of the gift and the money can be applied for some worthy case which needs care.

The "Happy Day Fund" is to be applied the same way except that some joy instead of a sorrow is to be commemorated, such as an anniversary, birthday, a wedding, a birth, etc. If we remember these two funds much good will come from them.

All women in Highland Park should belong to the Hospital Auxiliary. There are three membership, a regular membership which costs ten dollars, an associate membership at five, and a contributing membership at a dollar a year. This money is spent for supplies and the care of women and children.

The next meeting will be held January 17 at ten o'clock at Trinity Parish House. A luncheon for which there is no charge will be served. Remember a great many workers both for sewing and hospital dressing are needed. All women and girls are urged to reserve this day and come and help. An announcement will be made in the Press to call your attention to it the week before.
