LYCEUM SERIES PROMISES WELL

OPENING FEATURE GOOD

Katharine Ridgeway Proves a Splendid Entertainer; "Grizzly" Smith Here Jan. 17

Friday evening, in the Elm Place auditorium, a large audience attended the opening number of the lyceum series under the auspices of the Community Service organization. Katharine Ridgeway, dramatic reader and impersonator, was the attraction, and the program proved to be all that was promised for it.

Miss Ridgeway easily showed herself mistress of her art. Her selections were well chosen and rendered with marked talent and ability.

Three notable features were Barrie's "Wind," "The Rain" and a one-act comedy satire on the psychoanalysis fad. These made a distinct hit and won hearty and spontaneous expression of appreciation from the audience.

"Grizzly" Smith Jan. 17. The next number of the series is given Jan. 17, when C. L. "Grizzly" Smith, will entertain in his characteristic way, with tales of his strenuous experiences in the western wilderness.

"Grizzly" Smith, Boy Scout instructor in camping, hiking and nature study, has had a notable career as hunter, trapper, miner, lumberjack and prospector. From 1873, when he was seventeen years of age, to 1907 he spent a part of each year in the open, covering territory from southern California to the Canadian Rockies. During that time he canoed practically every stream in that territory large enough to float a craft of any kind.

Kills Many Bears
During numerous hunting expeditions "Grizzly" Smith has killed more than 100 black bears, nearly that many mountain lions and 32 grizzly bears.

He has been in all the states except Maine. He secured some valuable first-hand information on the wild life of Florida which he relates in nature-study stories for Boys' Life, the official magazine of the Boy Scouts of America. He has contributed frequently to Field and Stream, Rod and Gun, New York Sunday World, Recreation and In the Open.

His work in connection with the Boy Scouts has taken him on lecture tours into practically all the large cities of the East, where he has addressed prominent clubs and organizations interested in outdoor sports and recreation.

Other Numbers
The third number of the out of town features will be Laurant, master magician, who comes Feb. 23. In addition to these three entertainments by local talent will be given, the first to be staged Feb. 9. Elaborate preparations are being made to make these affairs the best of the kind ever offered here, and with the wealth of talent obtainable here, there is every reason to believe that these entertainments will in no way suffer in comparison with the professional programs.

The season ticket rate for this series is so low, three dollars for a whole family for the entire six entertainments, that everybody can avail themselves of the opportunities to hear first class features at a nominal price, and the success of the initial number augurs well for increasing attendance and greater interest in succeeding performances.

COUNCIL ACCEPTS STREET PAVEMENT

SUNSET TERRACE ALSO

First, Maria and Chicago Ave. Taken by City; Subdivision Plat Approved; Ry. Tenders Deeds

Paving contracts in several streets were finally accepted by the city council at a session held Saturday, Nov. 25. The Sunset Terrace subdivision also was accepted.

Transfer to the city of certain lots and a strip of land along the east side of St. John's avenue deeded to the city for street purposes to replace the portion of the street occupied by the North Shore railway from Wade street to the edge of Ravinia park was effected. These transfers are part of the contract made by the railway when it was given a franchise on St. John's avenue.

Paving Cost
The First street and Elm place paving was accepted at a total contract cost of \$36,901.01, to which is added costs of assessment, interest, etc., bringing the total to \$40,129.01. Maria street pavement was accepted by the council. The cost, including all accessories amounts to a total of \$6,338.80. The Chicago avenue paving, also accepted, totaled \$6,682.78, including all supplementary expense.

The council voted to accept the plat of Branigan Brothers' "Sunset Terrace" subdivision, and application for a sanitary sewer through it was referred to the city engineer to prepare an estimate of cost, etc.

Railway Deeds Accepted
Deeds and plats presented by the North Shore line deeding certain real estate, as previously described, to the city, were accepted. In the absence of Mayor Hastings, Commissioner Willits presided at this meeting, and other members present were Commissioners Cheney and Brown.

RAILWAY THIEVES TAKEN IN THE ACT

Detectives Capture Two Men at Park Avenue; Both Held Third Escapes

Two alleged railway thieves were arrested Thursday night of last week in the act of removing merchandise thrown from trains at Park avenue, west of the city. Railway Detectives Lynch and Schultz, who were on watch, surprised three men, but one managed to escape.

The two men arrested were Raymond O'Laughlin, 22, and Russell Henderson, 19, both of Chicago. They are reported to have been handling about \$500 worth of tobacco thrown from a passing freight train by themselves or accomplices. A fusillade of shots was fired when the officers appeared, but nobody was hit. The thieves had a touring car stolen the day before in Chicago, and this the officers seized.

The two men were taken to Chicago for identification and it was found they had criminal records, the police report. They were returned here, on Monday, and in Judge A. E. Smith's court, were held to the grand jury under bonds of \$6,000 each, on charges of burglary and larceny and carrying concealed weapons. Policemen Rafferty and Borkert took them to Waukegan yesterday and lodged them in the county jail to await action of the grand jury.
