EMMERSON URGES NEED OF THRIFT

RETRENCHMENT ADVISED

Increased Interest in Taxation on Part of People Indicates Sentiment Towards Tax Saving

Declaring that the burden of taxation is becoming too great for the people to bear, Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson of Illinois today urged before the National Association of Secretaries of State, the need for greater economy and efficiency in government. He is president of the association and his address sounded the keynote of the convention.

Four Ways
Four ways in which the demands of the taxpayer for retrenchment and increased efficiency may be met were outlined by Mr. Emmerson as follows:

First—Check the growing tendency to create new agencies to administer every new law enacted.
Second—Consolidate and reorganize so far as possible the agencies already in existence.

Third—Eliminate waste and reduce the number of employees.

Fourth—For positions requiring skill and training provide salaries sufficiently high to attract men of recognized ability.

New Constitution

"In Illinois," Secretary Emmerson said, "we are in the midst of a campaign for the adoption of a new constitution. Many important changes are proposed and the voters are showing some interest in the various sections, but I find that one subject is engrossing the attention of every voter. This is the revenue article. The people want to know what effect the new constitution will have on taxes."

"I have noticed this interest in taxation in other states. I do not believe there is any other subject in which the people of the nation are so much interested."

He quoted figures to show that the average cost of operating state government has increased in this country from 1903 to 1919, from \$2.30 per capita to \$6.05 per capita, and that during the period from 1915 to 1919 the cost of operating the federal government increased from \$10.00 per capita to 149.76 per capita.

People Restless

"Small wonder, therefore, that the citizen is restless and begins to ask himself whether we are headed and how much more he can stand," Mr. Emmerson continued.

"The increase in the cost of government has exceeded enormously both the increase in wealth and the growth of population. Our resources have not kept pace with our expenditures. We can't go on this way. The burden is becoming too great and something must be done about it."

LAKE CO. LEADS IN PERSONAL PROPERTY

Value Per Acre Greater Than in Any Other County; Next is Winnebago

Figures indicate that the value of personal property per acre in Lake county is the highest of any county in the state. Winnebago county is second.

The value of personal property in Winnebago county per acre is \$19.26. In Lake county the value of personal property per acre is \$32.96. These are the values of personal property per acre in these counties: Peoria, \$7.57; Boone, \$15.56; Stephenson, \$16.21; Ogle, \$16.16; Macoupin, \$5.15. According to the tables prepared by the Chicago & Northwestern railroad company tax experts, the average personal property per acre of lands in the twenty-two counties of the state traversed by that railroad is \$13.25.

Figures have been culled from cities of the size or near the size of Rockford. In Rockford, which heads the list, the amount of personal property per capita is \$506. Freeport has \$235. The wealthy city of Evanston has but \$218 to every person within her corporate limits. Aurora citizens each have \$222, Waukegan has \$125, Peoria has \$266, Springfield has \$187, Elgin has \$370 and LaSalle has \$395.

MANY INDICTMENTS FOR ILLICIT SALE

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 24.—A report received by Prohibition Director Gregory from Washington shows that indictments and criminal informations for liquor violations filed in the federal courts the past year, totaled 45,448.

The report says that through active cooperation between the Prohibition unit and the department of justice, there have been 26,273 convictions in federal courts. Judges throughout the country are imposing heavy jail sentences, in addition to fines, these jail sentences having a salutary effect upon violators.

It is further set forth in the report that there has not been a greater activity among violators, but greater efficiency in their apprehension.

STUDENTS COME FAR TO NORTHWESTERN U

FROM LANDS OVERSEAS

From China; Another Comes from Japan; Several Are Europeans; All Seek Education

Two foreign students at Northwestern University Dental School, who will have traveled nearly 28,000 miles before they get home again, have just been welcomed by Dean Arthur D. Black. Dr. Yen Chang, a Chinese dentist from Honolulu who was graduated from Northwestern Dental school in 1911, has just returned to Chicago for a post-graduate course of three weeks' duration. Following this short extra instruction, Dr. Chang and his oriental wife will tour the United States, but the objective of his trip was to receive instruction of a certain type in the dental school. The distance between Chicago and Honolulu and return is exactly 9,142 miles.

From Australia

L. O. C. Bayer, of Melbourne, Australia, also has matriculated at Northwestern Dental school and will remain for special instruction and laboratory work for a year or more. The distance to Melbourne and return is 18,628 miles. Meanwhile, various French, Scandinavian and Russian dentists are coming to America to complete their studies. At Northwestern, Dean Black announces the matriculation of Rene Courmand, a graduate of the Ecole Dentaire of Paris, who is taking undergraduate work in an effort to obtain his D. D. S. degree in an American professional institution. He will be working for at least a year.

Norwegian Student

M. O. Kagan, of Trondhagen, Norway, also is studying for his D. D. S. degree and so is Miss Margert Rudehus of Tranas, Sweden. A. Van Wyk, of Rotterdam, has entered for two years of undergraduate work, while several Russians who wrote for a chance to enter Northwestern Dental school were reluctantly refused on account of their inability to write or understand English. The enrollment at the Purple dental school this year is 500; the course is now five years, which includes one year of pre-dental work in liberal arts. The freshmen class is 25 per cent larger this year than last despite the lifting of scholarship requirements.

WIDE INTEREST IN LOCAL SERVICE PLAN

Center Gets Requests From Many Cities Regarding Lyceum System

Widespread interest is shown in the local Community Lyceum Course, in fact it is becoming nationally known. Requests have been received from Hagesstown, Ind., Huntington, W. Va., Bay City, Mich., Logan, Utah, and Glendale, Calif., wanting to know how it could be done. No doubt within a few years the lyceum platform will specialize in real novelties along educational lines, for communities are awakening to the fact that they have some real talent, all that is necessary is to locate it. Highland Park should be proud of the fact that they are the first community in the county to recognize this.

The boys clubs have devised a demerit system to govern themselves. The boys over 16 have organized two bowling teams and in the near future hope to have a jr. league in Highland Park. At the last meeting of the younger boys they adopted the motto: "Don't wait to be a man to be great, be a great boy." Each Friday evening they have their meeting and play games until 9 o'clock.

Each evening this week the center is being used by some different groups with the exception of Tuesday and Thursday when the Americanization classes meet. The enrollment now is about 60 and more teachers could be used to good advantage.

Under their supervision the children are arranging an America "Caure Souris" as it were. Original dances and pantomimes, readings and plays harmoniously blended by appropriate music and artistic lighting effects will be given.

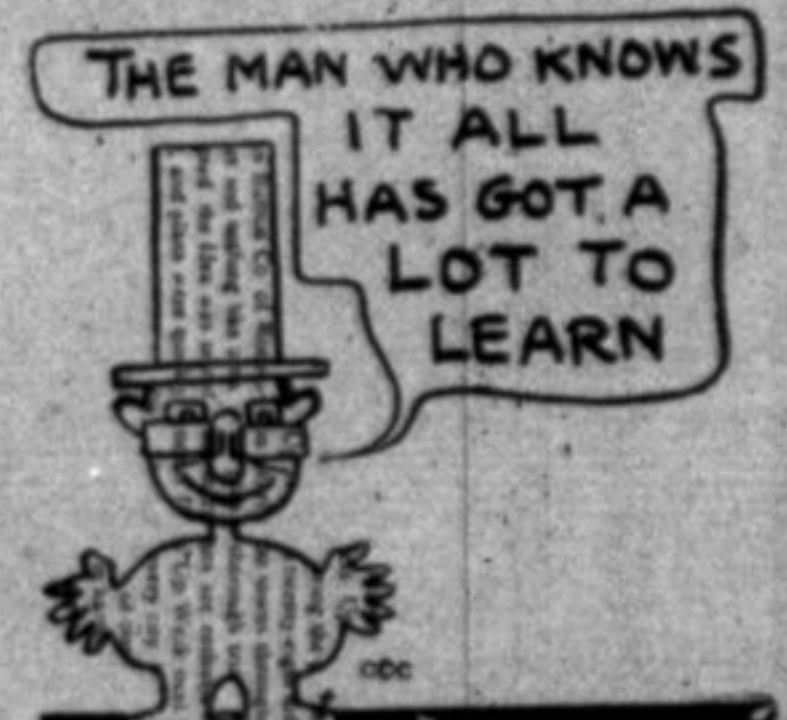
