

**ILLINOIS LEADING IN RED CROSS ROLL**

**First in Ten States in Number of Chapters Organized; Total is 101**

Illinois now leads the ten states in the Central Division of the American Red Cross in the number of chapters organized to carry on the annual Red Cross Roll Call, according to a statement from Walter Davidson, Manager, issued today. There are now 101 Illinois chapters carrying on a Roll Call for membership.

Bond County is the first in the state to send in a report of Roll Call results. This county, in one day more than doubled its last year's membership. Its campaign is still in progress throughout the chapter's jurisdiction. Princeton, Bureau County, reports that Roll Call there is meeting with marked success and will exceed all enrollments since war days.

From these and like reports from every central western state it is predicted that the present membership campaign will far surpass all previous ones since the signing of the Armistice.

**SUBURBAN TOWNS BOOST RED CROSS**

Suburban men and women have excelled the splendid work which they did last year in the enrollment of members in the American Red Cross. Only two suburbs have fallen below the mark, many have increased their membership and McKinley Park has twice as many Red Cross members as last year.

The Literary Digest says: "Nowhere is there a noble-spirited man, woman or child among the hundred million and more who are enjoying freedom and opportunity under 'Old Glory' who ought to answer at once to the annual roll-call of the American Red Cross, 'Here am I; count on me!'"

"America has no claim to greatness so unchallengeable as its record of unselfishness to humanity, and the voluntary enrollment and participation of its million of citizens, young and old, in that chiefest of all the world's agencies for human service, the American Red Cross."

Thanksgiving Day is the last official day of the enrollment, but many women have volunteered to get ten members each, so that the Chicago chapter may make its quota, for some of the city wards have fallen behind the good work of the suburbs.

The chapters reporting from eight states on the progress of the annual roll call indicate a very gratifying increase over last year's memberships, according to Walter Davidson, Manager of Central Division, in a statement issued today. 700 Chapters are active in practically as many counties of the division.

All of the preliminary reports from 12 of the 106 chapters in Illinois that are conducting an active roll call are satisfactory, although the numerical reports are incomplete. Some of the special instances of increases are worthy of note.

As examples may be mentioned Greenville, Illinois which has twice as many memberships as last year—420, as against 206. Mount Carmel has four times as many memberships 1900 this year against 236 last. The preliminary reports from other points for the first few days of the campaign show the vigor with which these enrollments have started.

**Happenings Here and There in Lake County Chronicled in Short Form for Busy Readers**

The suggestion that the old hand pump fire engine, used in Waukegan in the days when the steamer or motor pump were unknown, be destroyed and sold for junk, has met with several spirited protests. A number have urged Commissioner McDermott to retain the old pump for sentimental reasons.

Antioch had a big day last week. City officials opened up a stretch of road two and a half miles long—reaching from the south limits of Antioch to the Wisconsin state line, and it was celebrated with a great jollification.

Stanley Kroll of North Chicago, was arrested last week by Conrad A. Brune, chief of the dry agents out of State's Attorney A. V. Smith's office, for trucking liquor through Highland, according to the state report.

That Gus Carlson, 1801 South Park avenue, North Chicago, came to his death from poisoning resulting from the drinking of cheap whiskey was the verdict returned by the jury at a coroner's inquest held last week.

Refused aid by Henry Ford and the Andrew Carnegie organ fund, the members of St. John's Reformed church at Waukegan announce that they have purchased a new pneumatic 4,000 pipe organ from an organ company of Milwaukee.

Suit has been filed in the circuit court by George Ott, of Deerfield, to divide the estate of his father, the late Christian Ott, between himself and his brothers and sisters, Louis, Alice, Fred and Vincent Ott, and Mrs. Lucy Beckman.

"Not Guilty" was the verdict brought in by a jury in the circuit court last week in the case of George J. Wow, of Waukegan, on trial on charge of manslaughter. The acquittal exonerated him of the charge of wantonly killing Simon Orlovski, aged six, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Orlovski, last spring while driving an automobile.

Paul Glassman of Area, who recently offered to settle his entire estate upon "M. A. C.", the pretty girl who emerged from the wilderness of Canada to offer her heart and hand to the man who would advance \$1,000 so that she could bring her parents and brothers and sisters to the United States to get an education, is to be tried for his sanity.

A petition asking that his mental condition be tested was filed today in the county court at Waukegan, by relatives who fear that he will squander his fortune.

**FOREST FIRES ADD TO COST OF LIVING**

**Huge Waste Caused Increases in Cost of Lumber For Use in Building**

The United States Forestry service is inaugurating an educational campaign against forest fires, which it is hoped will be taken up by every school in the country and participated in by an army of 22,000,000 school children.

The necessity of some such campaign is evidenced by the fact that 33,000 forest fires occur annually of which over 60 per cent are caused by human carelessness. These fires destroy \$17,000,000 of wealth. They burn over 7,500,000 acres, an area greater than Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire and Rhode Island combined. The destruction annually of this vast amount of timber is reflected in the increasing price of lumber which enters into the manufacture of furniture and all wood products; into the building material of the country, and into other industries. It adds to the high cost of living and high rents.

**ANOTHER FEDERAL EXPENSE REDUCED**

**Bureau of Engraving Slashes Overhead by Cutting Its Force One-Fifth**

The annual report of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, discloses the fact that under the Republican administration there have been great economies effected in the conduct of the bureau, as well as an increase in its efficiency.

The bureau expended \$10,812,756 as against an expenditure of \$13,965,233 the previous year, a reduction of over \$3,000,000, or 22 per cent. It is of interest to note that the bureau did not expend all that was appropriated by congress. It returned to the public treasury an unexpended balance of \$1,058,447. This was probably the first time in the history of the bureau that money appropriated for its use was unexpended at the end of the year and turned back to the treasury. This

is in accord with records made by practically all the departments of the government under the Harding administration.

During the year the bureau reduced the number of its employes from 6,956 to 5,683, a reduction of 1,267 or 18.2 per cent.

Notwithstanding it operated at a reduction of 22 per cent in expenses and 18 per cent in personnel, the product of the bureau for the year was within 5 per cent of that of the previous year.
