RETIREES AFTER 42 YEARS OF SERVICE

Fred Rudolph of Highland Park Well Known County Officer, Ends Long Term

Fred Rudolph of Highland Park, for 42 years deputy sheriff of Lake county has quit the office which he has efficiently filled for two score of years. He began as deputy sheriff in 1880, under Sheriff Swantabaugh, and served under all succeeding incumbents. In the earlier years the sheriff was elected every two years and Mr. Rudolph's appointments therefore came biennially. Later, when the election law was changed and sheriffs were thenceforth elected for four-year terms, his appointments ran concurrent. He used to cover the county on horseback in the early days of his incumbency and sleep on a cot in the sheriff's office.

Mr. Rudolph is well known throughout the entire county as an able and efficient officer, with judgment and human sympathy who never exacted the full measure of his prerogative as an officer, choosing rather to consider the sensibilities and rights of his prisoners. His record is a fine one and he retires with the best wishes of the entire county for many more years of health, happiness and usefulness. His successor has not been named.

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
