Miss Mary McDowell was the speaker of the afternoon and instead of the subject previously announced for her lectures, talked on "The Hopeful Spots in Europe," which she thinks are Bohemia and Great Britain. Miss McDowell was in Europe the

greater part of last year studying conditions in the different countries. She was a delegate to the "International Conference of Settlement Workers in London-was for some time the guest of Pres. Masark of Czecho Slovakia-was at the conference in France and Switzerland and had most unusual opportunities for observation and first hand information. Miss McDowell held the close attention of the audience for over an hour and her hearers would have been glad of another hour. She strongly emphasized the need for a league of nations and said Europe needed America sadly-not so much our money, but our moral backing without which there could be no hope for any of the countries.
