BOY'S LEMONADE IN GREAT DEMAND

Tapped Father's Booze Supply to Liven Up Concoction; It Sold Well

BASIC INDUSTRIES IN PAYROLL BOOST

Marked Increases in Several Staple Lines Reported Over Last Year

The United States bureau of labor statistics shows that for the month of October, 34 of the 43 leading basic industries in the United States showed an increase in the total amount of payrolls as compared with the previous month. The largest increases were in the following industries: railroad car building and repairing, flour milling, glass, hosiery and knit goods, iron and steel, pianos. The decreases were slight with the exception of seasonal industries like the manufacture of fertilizer, and the pottery industry, which has been seriously affected by a general strike.
