Labitzky's Idyl, The Herd Girl's Dream, was much enjoyed, as were Anitra's Dance, and the good old Blue Danube, done in a most inviting way.

E. J. GREEN NAMED SUPT. OF PRISONS

Former Sheriff of Lake County Gets Good Appointment From Gov. Small

Positive confirmation of the report that Ex-Sheriff Elmer J. Green has landed a big plum in the shape of a political appointment by Governor Len Small to the office of superintendent of state's prisons, was given out Tuesday. Governor Small made the appointment Monday night. The appointment will be sent to the state senate for confirmation in January. At the same time Governor Small appointed John L. Whitman as warden of the state penitentiary at Joliet.

First reports received were that Mr. Green would be appointed as warden of the Joliet prison. Later it was said that he would have his choice of this position or superintendent of prisons. He selected the latter position. He will have charge of the state penitentiaries at Joliet and

Menard, the boy's reformatory at Pontiac and the Chester prison for the criminally insane.

Mr. Green stated that he has deferred his intended trip to Florida and will go to Springfield in a short time to be sworn in. His present plans are to continue to make his home in Waukegan.

F. C. MILLARD DIES IN ALHAMBRA, CALIF.

Fyederick Charles Millard, who spent his youth in this city died of apoplexy at his home in Alhambra, Calif., on December 12, in his 50th year. He was the son of the late S. M. Millard and brother of Mrs. Hugo G. Fisher and Everett L. Millard. His widow and two daughters survive him.

Mr. Millard was a consulting gas engineer and had lived in California since his 18th year, but had many friends here. He was greatly interested in natural science, especially birds, and had one of the largest aviaries on the Pacific coast.

VOTE TO UTILIZE ROAD FUND SURPLUS

The board of supervisors, at its meeting last week, adopted a resolution providing that the surplus funds refunded on state aid roads by the state department of highways be applied on the road connecting Telegraph road with the Wisconsin state line, and extending north from the Wadsworth road. The state of Wisconsin is building a hard road north from the state line, and the road which they plan to improve would connect with it.

NORTHWESTERN MAY ELECTRIFY LINES

Plan Reported Under Consideration by Company; Would Raise Tracks

Abandonment of the steam trains on the Chicago & Northwestern railroad and inauguration of electric cars in order to give 30 minute service and to cut the time 50 per cent between north shore towns and Chicago, is reported under consideration. Company officials are reticent, but it is said that while the plans have not been completed, the change must come because of the growing popularity of electricity in line. The public today demands quick service and the idea is that by running electric cars every few minutes rather than operate steam trains of units units the public would be better served from the standpoint of time saving, and that the operation of large units by steam is much more costly.

Engineers are reported to be already working on plans for changing over the railroad to convert it into an electric road. This plan includes the elimination of grade crossings. The construction of viaducts, subways and elevated tracks would be necessitated, but this would make possible the operation of very rapid trains, and it is estimated that the running time between Waukegan and Chicago could be cut 30 minutes.
