ARGENTINA LOATH TO TALK DISARMING

REDUCTION IS FAVORED

South American Nation Is Willing to Discuss Limitation in Military Preparedness

Argentina has informed Brazil of its unwillingness to accept the invitation to confer with Brazil and Chile on a program of armament reduction which it was proposed to work out between the three leading countries of South America preliminary to consideration of the subject at the Pan-American Conference in Santiago next March. The viewpoint of Argentina is reported to be that the question of military reduction could be discussed and disposed of fully as well by a subcommittee at the Pan-American Congress as at an earlier and separate gathering of representatives of Argentina, Brazil and Chile.

Makes Conference Possible
In view of Argentina's attitude it is believed possible therefore that the proposed conference at Valparaiso can be held. The Pan-American Congress, however, will be advanced to as early a date as possible and it is understood that it may be opened on March 4. The invitations to this conference will be sent to the other American republics by Chile, host of the conference, through the diplomatic representatives of Chile in the various American capitals to the respective foreign offices.

Hughes to Attend
Secretary Hughes will attend the Santiago conference, if his official duties will permit; he being desirous of being present at this important gathering of the 21 American republics. It is doubtful, however, if the secretary will remain throughout the conference, which may last a month or more. He will probably go as did Elihu Root, secretary at that time, to the Pan-American Congress in Rio de Janeiro as a guest of the American delegation rather than as its official head.

The secretary probably will take the opportunity, if he goes to Santiago, of visiting several other South American countries.
