CARRY TAX CASE TO THE SUPREME COURT

The appeal from the county court of Lake county by George D. McLaughlin of Lake Forest in behalf of himself and other taxpayers of Lake Forest and Highland Park in the case brought in the county court against them by County Treasurer Roy W. Bracher to obtain judgment against them for taxes, has just been submitted to the supreme court on briefs and without oral argument. The taxpayers named in the suit object to the bond issue on the ground that it was illegal. The legality of the bond issue was upheld by the local court and the objectors immediately took an appeal to the supreme court. Just when a ruling will be obtained is problematical but it will be awaited with keen interest.

Should the ruling be that the bond issue was illegal it is hard to say just what the result would be although it is expected to have no effect other than relieving the objectors from paying their portion of the assessment.
