LATENT ART SEEN IN CHICAGO YOUTH

Italian Bootblack Demonstrates Ability as "Thrower" in Pottery Making

That there is much latent art talent not being utilized in Chicago's great population, especially amongst the foreign element hailing from art-loving countries, goes without saying. Mr. William Wilkins, of Lewis Institute, in his demonstration of pottery-making at the Art Institute last Monday before the Association of Arts and Industries, cited a case of this kind.
During one of his demonstrations last summer, Mr. Wilkins noticed an Italian youth who displayed much interest in his work of "throwing" pottery. "I have a brother who is a bootblack. He can do that fine," said the youth. "Bring him here," said Mr. Wilkins. Now it happens that the

process of "throwing" is one that requires great skill and there are only a few potters in this country capable of turning out by hand real art work. The Italian came and surprised Mr. Wilkins with some remarkable demonstrations. The man was immediately offered a position at twice the salary he was receiving, but as it involved leaving his family and living in a distant state, it was declined. The American method of making pottery is by casting, a much easier and quicker method, but the artistic value of the product is correspondingly lowered.
