"THE LAST WARNING" TO COME TO CHICAGO

Blackstone Theatre Prepares for Sensational Mystery Drama

No play in the history of Broadway has had the unique history that is associated with "The Last Warning," the sensational mystery melodrama, now playing at the Klaw Theatre, West 45th street, New York City, which has taken the town by storm. The play was written by Thomas F. Fallon who peddled it around to every producing manager in New York, everyone of whom accepted it only to reject it again.

Thomas F. Fallon, who was formerly an actor, conceived the idea of writing "The Last Warning," through a chance reading of Wadsworth Camp's well known novel "The House of Fear." He had already written two long dramas, and a number of successful one act plays, but, in undertaking the Camp novel, he was attempting something new. For the story is full of trick situations and stage novelties and breaks virtually every rule of play-writing.

The cast is an excellent one and includes William Courtleigh, Ann Mason, Charles Trowbridge, Marion Lord and many others.

So great was Fallon's faith in his play, however, that he abandoned all his work, in order to make the rounds of the managers. By the time he reached the present producers, he was reduced to complete poverty. Oddly enough, the present producers also, were almost in the same condition. Their names are Michael Goldreyer and Michael Mindlin and they are known to Broadway as the "Kid Producers." Both young men are in their early twenties and both have known poverty and hardships.

Now, their doings are exploited in every paper by the critics and the columnists, and already the magazines are writing feature stories about them. Nightly the crowd flock to see their play and nightly the "kid producers" become richer and richer, glowing examples of American daring, ingenuity and perseverance.

So successful has been "The Last Warning" that arrangements are being made now for the production of the play at the Blackstone Theatre, Chicago, Ill.

FARMERS' WEEK AT UNIVERSITY

Agricultural Conference Held Jan. 22 to 25 at Urbana is of Interest

Farmer's Week at the University of Illinois will be January 22-26, it is announced. This one week of agricultural conferences and discussions displaces what has previously been known as the agricultural short course which lasted two weeks.

Three or four speakers of national prominence will appear on the program.

The farm as a unit will be considered. Some of the principal topics to be discussed are: Factors determining systems of farming; physical layout of the farmstead; locations of buildings; garden and lawn; the maintenance of soil fertility; plant relationships; means of reducing cost of farming operations; importance of accounting; marketing problems; relations of the farmer to his farm organizations; community standards; etc. Intensive class work will be given in Animal Husbandry, Poultry, Dairying, Farm Crops, Soils, Farm Mechanics, Farm Management and Horticulture.

The day sessions will consist of lectures, demonstrations and laboratory work, arranged to cover special subjects of interest to every one. The evening sessions will be devoted to addresses by speakers of national prominence. The meeting will close Friday evening, January 26, with a good fellowship banquet to be given in the Stock Judging Pavilion.

The program is arranged especially to meet the needs of farmers and farmers' sons. Citizens from Illinois and other states are invited to attend. No registration fees or examinations are required. The only expenses of the meeting will be that of travel and living expenses while attending.

FIRE LOSS IN 1922
TOTALS \$64,855.00

Garnett's Most Serious of Year; Firemen Make 90 Calls in Twelve Months

With the exception of the disastrous fires in the Garnett store and Evans building, Jan. 22 of last year, Highland Park's fire record for 1922 shows that the fire department by prompt and efficient service was able to keep the total loss down to a fair minimum.

The total fire loss on buildings for the year, according to records kept in the fire station, was \$43,236.07, of which \$40,000 is credited to the Garnett fire.

On contents the total loss was \$21,618.33, according to this record. The total number of alarms answered by the department was 90, and the average loss per fire was \$7,206.11.

Total insurance carried on buildings damaged by fire during the year was \$1,051,266.67 and on contents, \$525,635.33, making a grand total of 1,576,902 carried on property damaged or menaced by fire during the year.

During the year a powerful Packard twin-six combined truck and 750-pumper was purchased, adding greatly to the efficiency of the department's equipment. About 1,000 feet of new hose was bought, and the doors and interior of the fire station were remodelled to afford more room for the equipment. With these improvements the department is in better condition to meet any emergency than at any time in the past, and in 1923 its splendid record as a volunteer fighting aggregation will undoubtedly be still further enhanced.
