SAMUEL LEVIN IS CALLED TO REST

DIED ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Long an Esteemed Resident in Highland Park and Well Known Merchant; Buried in East

Samuel Levin, a resident of Highland Park for 24 years and for all but one year of that time engaged in the jewelry business in East Central avenue, died Friday night at his home, 116 South First street, following more than 18 months of illness. He was in his 58th year and is survived by his wife and one son, Lester Levin, a traveling salesman for a large jewelry firm in Iowa, and who came to this city to attend the funeral. Mr. Levin was well known and highly esteemed in this community in which he had lived and conducted a successful business for so many years and had a host of warm friends by whom his death is deeply regretted, and whose sympathy is extended the family at this time. He was a member of the Masonic order, the I. O. O. F., the order of the Eastern Star and the White Shrine of Jerusalem. The funeral was held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in the H. M. Prior chapel. The Masons, of which order Mr. Levin was for many years an honored member, were in charge of the service. The body was placed in a receiving vault in Memorial Park until a suitable time, when Mrs. Levin plans to take the remains to her old home in Pennsylvania for interment.

F. R. McMULLEN, FORMER RAVINIA MAN, DIES

One of the Founders of Ravinia; Died Saturday in New York Home

Frank R. McMullen, 54 years old, one of the first group of guarantors of the Chicago Opera company and one of the founders of Ravinia park, who died in New York last Saturday, was buried at Graceland cemetery in Chicago on Tuesday afternoon. The body was brought to Chicago by the widow, Mrs. Jessie Lake McMullen, and the eldest son, James C. McMullen. The McMullen family were former residents of Ravinia, coming to that village about 22 years ago where they resided until about 11 years ago. At that time they sold their residence to Julius Rosenwald, and moved to Ossing, N. Y., where they are now living. Mr. McMullen leaves besides his wife, two sons and one daughter to survive him.

DIPHTHERIA WANES; MEASLES PLENTIFUL

No New Cases of Former Disease and Schools are Reopened

Diphtheria is checked and measles are rampant in Highland Park this week. The schools, closed last week because of the several cases of the former disease reported in the city, were reopened Monday and there have been no cases reported, health board officials say. It is believed the danger of further extensive spread of the contagion is past, if proper precautions are observed. Measles, however, have appeared in numerous instances and eight or ten cases were reported Monday and more Tuesday and Wednesday. The health authorities are keeping a close watch on the situation and advising parents regarding the care of children affected and the precautions to be taken to prevent infection of others. All Sunday schools will be in session as usual next Sunday. The Press said last week that "the order of the board of health closing the schools has been complied with in each instance, with the exception of the parochial school." It has since been learned that the parochial school was closed Thursday morning. Other schools were closed earlier in the week immediately following the issuance of the orders of the health board. The high school gym will be opened Saturday morning for the children of the grammar school.
