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

the aviation field, Fort Sheridan, when his plane crashed into a tree and broke into flames. His mechanician, Sergt. Dizner Ball, who was in the rear cockpit of the plane, was not in-

The accident took place when Lieut. Fox was taking off to return to Chanute field. He had flown up the day before to visit friends at the fort. As the machine left the ground it was caught by a cross current of air and as it swerved it crashed into the lower branches of a large tree.

The impact tossed the plane sidebefore he could aid Lieut. Fox the plane was a mass of flames from an exploding gasolne tank.

Lieut. Fox was from New York state. A sister lives at Rantoul, Ill. The aviator was noted for bravery and had seen service overseas
