MEMORY CONTEST
IN MUSIC SOON
HIGH AND GRADE SCHOOLS
To Be Held in Deerfield and New Trier Preliminary, and the Final Contest in Orchestra Hall

The Music Memory contest movement which was inaugurated last year in both the grade and high schools, is to be continued this year. Work will begin in earnest next week with the beginning of the new semester. All students will be allowed to enter, and many of the parents will no doubt catch the spirit of the contest and find it as interesting as the students. In many localities the grown-ups actually get into the game and make the final contest an event of city-wide interest.

Representative Compositions
A list of 35 of the world's most beautiful and representative compositions has been selected for the grade schools with an additional 15 for the high school students. It would be difficult to find a program given by reputable performers or organizations, except the most erudite of symphony orchestra programs which would not contain one or more of these numbers. The afternoon programs of the Little Symphony, both in Highland Park and at New Trier, are taken extensively from this list, and other numbers were performed by the Business Men's orchestra and will be included in the program of the Northwestern Symphony, Feb. 16.

Varied Lists
There are many types of music represented—solos for voice, violin and piano; movements from symphonies, sonatas and concertos; numbers, both vocal and instrumental, from opera and oratorio; and many American compositions are included, ranging from the beautifully lyric, "From the Land of the Sky Blue Waters" of Cadman, to the rollicking "Juba Dance" by Dett. In short, there are numbers to please everyone; dance forms of many nations; Victor Herbert and Sousa; the paths of the negro spiritual, and one of the most beautiful bits of counterpoint ever written, the Largo from Bach's Concerto for Two Violins.

Grand Climax
The grand climax of the contest will come about April 1, when the final contest will be held in Orchestra hall, with Mr. Stock and the entire Chicago Symphony playing numbers from the contest list. About 30 teams of five members each representing all compete.

Preliminary contests to pick the members of these teams will be held in the Deerfield-Shields high school and New Trier high school, in which the high school and grade schools in each district will compete. The contest is held under the auspices of the "In and About Chicago Supervisors club", one of the most progressive organizations of that nature in the country.

MILWAUKEE PLANS ANOTHER REGATTA

Milwaukee is the home city of many nationally known boat and engine building companies and these men will all have representatives at the big motor boat show to urge the plea of their city for representation on the motor boat racing and regatta map of 1923.
