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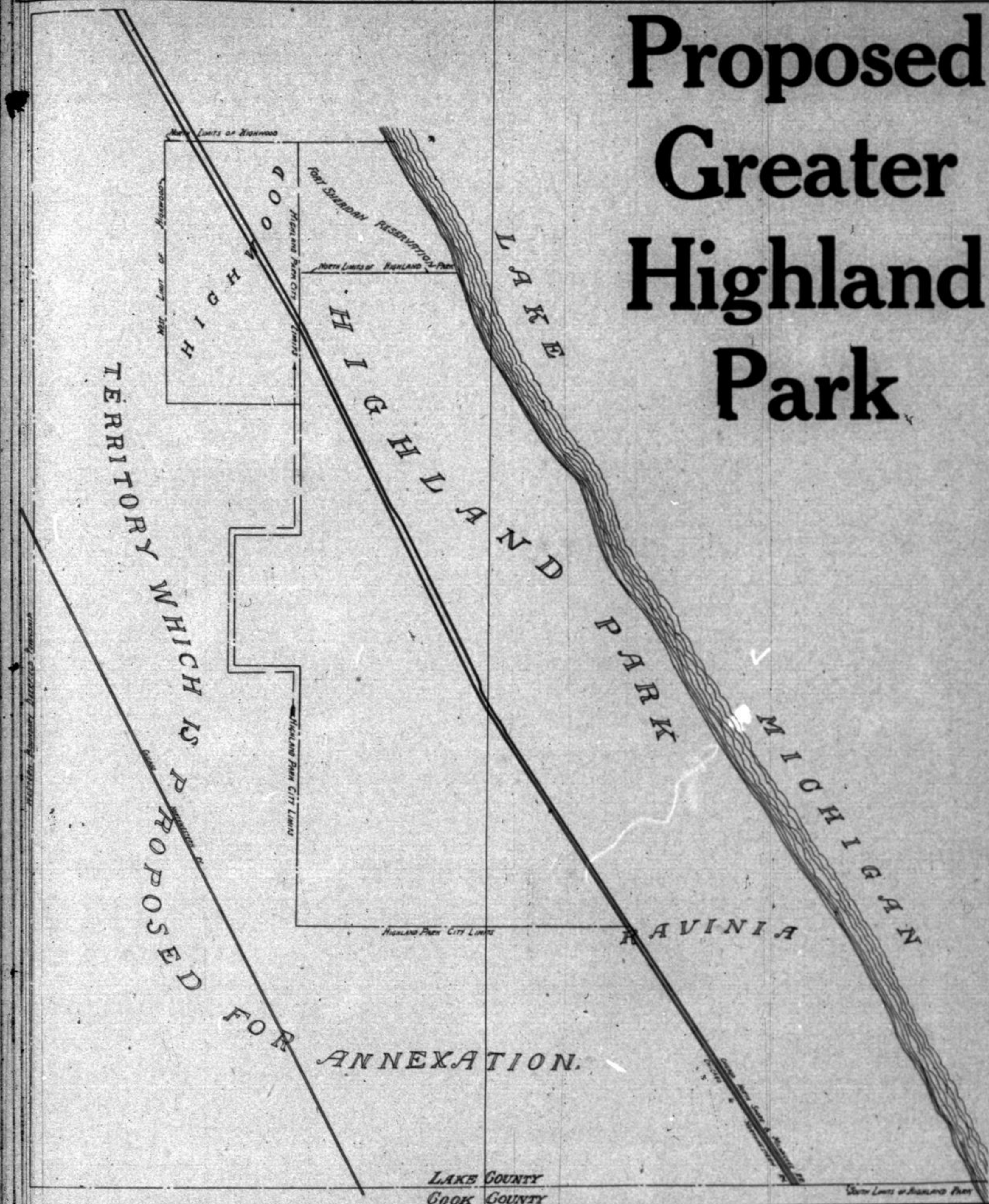

posed to annex, to be free to express their opinion and to offer any suggestion which they may deem timely and pertinent. We believe that the plan, if carried into effect, will be a great thing for Highland Park and a source of inestimable value to its people and to the residents and property owners of the territory to be annexed."

Preliminary Work Done
The committee on investigation reported its preliminary investigation of property valuations and tax rates, present and prospective, should the annexation plan be adopted, at a meeting of the commission held last Thursday evening. This report indicates no serious increase in tax rates, as compared with the tremendous influence in the direction of increased value of property which the annexation would cause.

Conclusions of Report
After giving the figures on taxation, present and prospective, the report concludes:

"It will be observed that in all school districts of the townships outside of Highland Park, there would be a uniform increase of the tax rate irrespective of whether within or without the North Shore Sanitary District. Within the present limits of Highland Park there would also be a reduction of the tax rate of 72 cents, but the city would lose its portion of the Road and Bridge Tax now levied over the entire township.

Township Organization
"The effect of the annexation of all territory of the township outside of the present limits of incorporated cities we find would involve an examination of the statutes of a greater extent than the committee in its limited time could give, but from the brief examination given, we believe that the annexation would leave only a skeleton organization, with most of the duties of the present officers eliminated. The principal township officers consist of a supervisor, assistant-supervisor, town clerk, assessor and highway commissioner, who are elected at the town meeting every two years. The powers vested in townships are exercised by the electors at the town meetings and the statute provides that any towns where the boundaries incorporated cities are co-extensive with the limits of the town, the only powers which may be exercised are with reference to property owned by the town, to provide for the conduct of law suits and to make the by-laws.

in a city may be organized as a separate town, and thereafter all the powers vested in the town, including the powers vested in the highway commissioner, shall be exercised by the city council and the office of the town clerk shall be united with the office of the city clerk, and the office of the highway commissioner shall be discontinued.

"It would appear, therefore, that after the annexation of the territory now outside of the city limits, after complying with the terms of the law with reference to certain procedure, that the only township officers remaining would be the supervisor, assistant-supervisor and assessor.

"The committee deemed it unnecessary to make a more extensive investigation of the question of changes of township organization and officers at this time, but if it is deemed advisable by the commission to go into the matter more exhaustively, we believe the subject should be referred to an attorney."

Report of Committee

Following is a table of comparative tax rates worked out by the committee, after due investigation, covering both the existing conditions and those probable as indicated by the proposed annexation; these figures are based on 1922 rates and include the city of Highland Park and the territory which it is proposed to annex:

INCOME TAX SOON NEEDING ATTENTION

Revenue Officers Visiting All Counties; Forms Soon to Be Distributed

Revenue officers are visiting every county in the United States to aid taxpayers in the preparation of their income tax returns for the year 1922. Information concerning the date of their arrival and the location of their offices may be obtained by writing the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer lives. Forms of filing returns of individual net income for the year 1922 are being sent to taxpayers who filed returns for the year 1921. Failure to receive a form, however, does not release the taxpayer of his obligation to file a return and pay the tax on time, on or before March 15, 1923. The forms, 1040A for filing returns of net income \$5,000 and less and 1040 for filing returns of net income in excess of \$5,000, may be obtained

from collectors of internal revenue and deputy collectors.

Returns are required of every single person whose net income for 1922 was \$1,000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more and of every married person whose net income was \$2,000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more. Careful study of the instructions on the forms will greatly aid in making a correct return.
