Commenting on the closing of this valuable life the Chicago Journal of Commerce 'printed' on February 28, the following editorial which indicates the high esteem in which Mr. Boynton was held by his associates in the business world and how greatly his ability and achievements were appreciated by those who knew his worth: Charles T. Boynton

"The news columns of this and other newspapers this morning announce in a matter of fact way the death of Charles T. Boynton, These prosaic statements do not tell the story, however. Few men in business will be as sincerely mourned as will "Charley" Boynton, as he was known to all his associates. His was a busy and varied career and he made a host of friends in every walk of life.

"There was nothing spectacular or heroic about him, yet he was a dominant figure in Chicago's commercial and financial circles. His name seldom appeared in the newspapers and yet he was known as a "giant" of the financial world.

"Charles Boynton received his start in business with John W. Gates. Gates manufactured barbed wire and Boynton sold it, and he made a name for himself in this work. He then joined W. L. Brown of Pickards, Brown & Co. in the distribution of pig iron. Then followed in quick succession the formation of Solvay Coke, By-Products Coke and Steel and Tube company, and his share in these enterprises won him an enviable reputation as an organizer. He was a large factor in the organization of Consumers company, in which he con-

greatest responsibility and to which he devoted several hours each morning was his membership in the exe-cutive committee of the Continental and Commercial National Bank.

"Withal he was a firm believer in recreation mixed with work. He insisted his associates and employes take regular vacations, and he lived in the out doors. A remarkable pedestrian, he early realized the value of golf to the tired business man, and was one of the organizers of the Glen View and Old Elm clubs.

"Such was the life of this man whom every associate and employe will miss. The news columns tell that he died but bankers and elevator men alike will say this morning that one of the finest men they knew
