NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Happenings of Interest Here and There About This Section; News From County Seat in Brief

Thursday of last week, in the circuit court, Mrs. Lillian Horner, of Lake Bluff, was granted a divorce by Judge C. Edwards, from Harry Horner, formerly of North Chicago, on charges of desertion.

William Farris, 50 years old, justice of the peace at Half Day, just south of Libertyville, recently was arraigned in municipal court, Chicago, where Judge Joseph Schulman bound him over to the grand jury, on charges of auto theft.

The City of Zion has lost its battle for cheaper coal rates from the mines, according to word just received from Washington, D. C. The case which was started against the Evansville Suburban and Newburgh railway. The Interstate Commerce Commission has just dismissed.

Notice has been served on Waukegan contractors that starting April 1, the wage of carpenters probably will be \$1.25 an hour—an increase of 15 cents an hour. The carpenters' district council of Chicago with which the local union is affiliated, took a secret ballot of its 21,000 members. There were but 159 negative votes.

Sub Chaser 419, assigned to port of Waukegan last year as a part of the equipment of the local naval reserves, will return there as soon as navigation on the Great Lakes opens officially, according to a naval official attached to the naval reserve force. Recruiting in this branch of the naval service has not warranted a larger boat being sent as the officials have desired.

Waukegan Elks' cheered loudly at their annual meeting last week when C. S. Alshuler, chairman of the building committee appointed to raise funds for a \$250,000 club house announced that \$50,000 worth of stock already has been subscribed in \$1000 blocks.

Grace Missionary church congregation today filed a petition for mandamus against the city of Zion and W. Hurd Clendenin, mayor, to compel the latter to issue to them a permit to complete construction work on the church. The action is a new angle to an old fight, which dates back to May 6, 1921, when Zion officials compelled the church to stop work of construction on the church when the foundation had been completed.

A deal whereby the Waukegan Y. M. C. A. property was sold for \$130,000, was closed last week. H. C. Burnett, president of the Waukegan National bank, is named as the buyer. Mr. Burnett asserts however that he is not alone in the deal—he says that a group of Waukegan men made the purchase. He says the deal is purely speculative.
