Bob Greenslade and Tom Clark took a 73 pin lead on John Wezzi and Frank Krems of the Vermont league. The last-half of the match will be rolled next Sunday afternoon at the Vermont alleys in Chicago. Greenslade was the high man of the first half shooting consistently close to a 200 average.

County government is breaking down all through Illinois and there is a growing tendency to come to the state for money and men in local law enforcement work, it was pointed out in the senate committee on appropriations today when the bill to give \$50,000 for special prosecutions in Rock Island county was passed out favorably at Springfield a few days ago. Senator John Dailley, (Rep., Peoria), first raised this point. It was agreed to by other observing senators and by Attorney General Brundage, who appeared before the committee.

"There is a disposition to pass the buck—let some one else do the work and pay for it," said Senator Harold Kesinger (Rep., Kane).

Mr. Brundage pointed out that he had been summoned into Marshall, Rock Island, Williamson, Cook and Rock Island counties.

"There would not have been a cleanup at all if we had not gone into Rock Island county," he said. "The trials are now ready and we have no money to continue the work."
