Community Service Director in Effort to Aid Children's Home Amusement Tells New Games

Bob is telling Joe about the club they have at home. Bob has a brother and sister at home besides his mother and father.

"You needn't laugh, Joe, this club is great. We have two club meetings every week and every one of us have to have a new game or stunt every meeting night. After supper us kids wash the dishes and do the work for mother while she and dad get ready for the club meeting, they always give us some dandy new games and stunts."

"What are they Bob? Sounds good to me, all the parties and things, I have been going to are getting stale, playing the same old games every time."

"Well, Joe, here are some of the stunts we use at home. You see a stunt is a game that comes in handy after we have played some active games."

Cut Glass—I'll bet you never knew Joe, that you can cut glass with scissors. All you have to do is to put the glass in a pail of water and cut while it is under water.

Mirror Drawing
 Try this one sometime. Put a mirror in front of you on a table, with some writing paper next the mirror. Then hold a paper up in front of you, so that you can see the paper, but can look in the mirror and draw a five pointed star on it.

Jug Balancing
 This sure is a hard one! Put a jug on the floor on its side and sit on it lengthwise. Extend your feet and put one foot on top of the other so that only the heel of one foot is on the floor. Take your pencil in one hand and writing pad in the other and write your name without touching the floor with your hands. If the girls want to try the stunt let them thread a needle.

"Blow-Out"
 Blindfold someone. Put a lighted candle on the table. Turn the blindfolded fellow around several times and let him try to blow out the candle. He'll have an awful hard time doing it, believe me.

Opera Glass Race
 Here's a funny one. Mark out an irregular line, or use a string about twelve feet long. Take an opera glass and look through the glass. We made a race of this by having two lines and two opera glasses. It's some stunt to walk back looking through the end of the opera glass.

STATE'S ATTORNEY
 TURNS OVER FINES
 More Than \$10,000 Collected
 In Three Months; Record

A check amounting to \$10,851.70 was turned over to County Treasurer Ira Pearsall today by States Attorney A. V. Smith that covered the fines and fees for three months.

The exact dates through which the money was taken in were between Dec. 12 and March 5. This amount stands as a record in the state outside of Cook county, which has a population forty times as great as Lake, and is nearly as great as the fees and fines collected in all of the other counties put together.

In the two and a half years he has been in the office he has collected and turned over to the county the sum of \$80,918.15, far in excess of the amounts turned in by Lake county prosecutors combined for the last half score of terms.

The office is paying its own expenses and also has money to the good, the report shows. This is also a record for local prosecutors. He has a sum of more than \$2,000 ahead of running expenses now.

PROBATION WORK
 IN COUNTY LARGE
 Annual Report Shows That 382 Children Were Supervised
 Other Details

The annual report of Miss Mary Polmeteer, county probation officer, on the work done in her department of the juvenile court and public welfare, which she submitted to the county board Tuesday afternoon, shows that the activities of the department were unusually large and of greater importance than many members of the board realized.

The report showed that during the year 382 children were given supervision. There were 61 delinquency cases, 36 being boys and 25 girls. There were 321 dependency cases. Seven cases of mothers monthly pensions were handled.

TURKS TATTOO FACE OF WOMAN CAPTIVE
 SHE TELLS STORY HERE

Beautiful Armenian Girl Tells of Terrible Experiences; Is On Her Way to Rejoin Spouse

Mrs. Elisa Shahan, a beautiful Armenian girl whose face was tattooed by order of a Turk to prevent her escape from his house where she was held as a slave, arrived in Chicago yesterday on her way to join her husband in East St. Louis.

In the Chicago office of the Near East Relief, 19 South La Salle street, Mrs. Shahan told how she had escaped from Smyrna with her husband on a Greek troop ship twenty-four hours before the city was burned.

Aged Minister
 Mrs. Shahan is nineteen years old. She told of three massacres which she witnessed, the first in 1915 when her family was deported from their home in Asia Minor to the Arabian Desert and her father, together with all the other men of the party, was killed by the Turks.

"I was then twelve years old," said Mrs. Shahan. "The Turks took me and a lot of the other little girls and tied us all together with a rope. Then they threw us in the Euphrates river, but from the other side, of the river came Arabian women swimming. They cut the rope and five of us were saved."

Taken Unconscious
 "I was taken, unconscious, by the Arabian leaders and marched into the wilderness, where I was sold to the chief of the robbers for 40 piastres. The robber chief had twelve wives and sixty-seven children. I was taking of their children."

"You must be a Mohammedan," they said, but I knew that Mohammed was only a shepherd and I could not love him as I loved my Christ. I called the chief a liar man and he imprisoned me for forty days. He threw me dry breads and couchi-couchi-dog meat.

"She's going to die in her own belief," they said; "then we'll be sinners." But I told them I would rather die than become a Mohammedan. They took me to a roof where there were six Armenian priests. The Arabs were digging out their eyes and finger nails.

Tatto Her Face
 "All right. Do to me like that," I said. "I will not be a Mohammedan." They put tattoos on my face. For weeks I lay as one dead. But I determined to escape. There wasn't any place to fly away—all the doors closed. I climbed to the roof of a stable. There was a hole in the roof. One midnight I threw myself down that hole and flew away. The shepherds were too tired and didn't look. Only the dogs began to bark.

"Maybe the robbers came to rob us" said the shepherds. "Or maybe an Armenian girl is running away." They got their horses and cried: "Stop, you gavone—which is a swear word meaning Christian Dog. I'm running downhill to the village. They begin to shoot. The leads burn my arms and hair."

"Then they catch me and ask why I am running away. They tie me by a rope to a horse and drag me back to the village."

How She Was Rescued
 How she was rescued by Armenian soldiers from Mousul; how she escaped a massacre in Aleppo; how she finally was escorted to Smyrna by English soldiers who swept down in bombing planes and how she escaped from pillaged Smyrna form subsequent chapters of her story.

COUNTY HOSPITAL
 HAS BUSY QUARTER
 Report Shows Patients Averaged 46 Daily; Births 18; Deaths 20

The quarter, including Dec., Jan. and Feb., was an unusually busy one for the Lake county hospital, the report of the hospital committee to the county board Monday afternoon shows.

During the quarter the receipts were \$4,763.44. The amount paid to the hospital during February was \$1,804.10, this being considerably higher than in December (\$1,366.09) and Jan. (\$1,559.25).

The daily average of patients was as follows: Dec. 42.7; Jan. 45.3; Feb. 51.4. There were eighteen births at the hospital and twenty deaths. Major operations 36, minor operations 58.

The report showed a balance of \$1,788.40 on hand.

LAKE COUNTY POOR REPORT TO BOARD
 Funds Expended for Keep of the Inmates and General Care of Destitute

It cost Lake county \$3,273.07 for board and tuition for the dependents of the county at the various state charitable institutions, according to a report submitted to the board of supervisors today.

Another report submitted shows that the total cost of caring for Lake county's poor, outside of Waukegan, Shields and Deerfield townships, during the last quarter was \$3,134.70. The report shows that most of the poor of Lake county are located on the "Gold Coast" which proves that where the richest people reside, there are the poorest ones also abundant. There are very few families dependent on charity in the rural districts.
