#### ADDITION TO RAIL MEN'S HOME HALTED

Zoning Ordinance and Decrease in Number of Inmates Factors; Plans Ready

Present prospects are that the proposed addition to the Railroad Men's Home here, authorized at the last annual meeting of the board to be built at a cost of about \$100,000 will not be proceeded with until next ear, at least. It appears that after the blueprints

were made it was found that the plans conflicted with the city's zoning ordinance, in that the new addition would be erected closer to the line than the ordinance permits, and hence the railroad home officials de cided to await further developments before proceeding with the building Besides this, Superintendent O'Keefe reports, that because of five deaths in the home in the past year and the fact that five other inmates ad returned to their homes or left for other destinations, there are now

ten beds available, and it is not believed that the home will be crowded before fall when the men usually come in, so that for the present there is no immediate prospect of lack of accommodations,, and building plans will be held up pending further de-
