LOCATE NEW BOG IN LAKE COUNTY

The natural wonders of Illinois have a new addition.
According to an announcement made by W. G. Waterman, assistant professor of botany at Northwestern university, a good-sized peat bog has been discovered near Cedar Lake, in the northern part of the county.
The bog is comparatively immature, Professor Waterman states, and will afford naturalists an excellent opportunity to watch and study its formation. There is a possibility, he asserts, that the discovery will overthrow the belief that all northern bogs are direct relics of the glacial invasion.
The Cedar Lake bog is a quaking, floating mass of roots that rests on ten feet of water. Because of its unstable condition, no attempt is made to harvest the luxurious crops of cranberries that grow on its surface.
