ENDORSE MODERN SEWER

The Election April 17 Promises Active Interest; Citizen's Ticket Enters the Field

The following communication regarding the new ticket in the field in the village of Deerfield was handed in by friends of this ticket.

The spring election in Deerfield promises active interest through the New Citizens' ticket which has entered the field. This party has presented the following ticket and platform for approval in the election next Tuesday: April 17th.

PLATFORM
This ticket is pledged to the following principles:
1. The immediate building of an adequate sewer system after approval by a majority of the people at public hearing. This sewer to be built under competent supervision.
2. Investigation of water supply to the end that we may have an ample supply of water for our village at all times.
3. The conservative development the village toward an up-to-date community.
During the last year there seems to have developed in Deerfield a feeling that now is the time to plan for a strictly modern and adequate sewer planned to take care of the future development of the village. While preliminary steps have been made by the present administration to put in a system that will temporarily take care of the village, the consensus of opinion seems to be that such an installation would have to be supplemented soon with an auxiliary sewer that would cost much more in the long run than doing the job right at the beginning.

first two planks of the platform of the Citizens' Ticket—the sewer, and the water supply—are questions that should be handled in the right way at once, if we are going to encourage the future growth of Deerfield. These questions we want to have investigated and laid before the people—their approval or disapproval entirely to govern. PLAN TO DEDICATE HOSPITAL MAY 30

Effort Being Made to Have New Building Ready for This Memorial Day

Spurred on by a desire to hold the dedication of the new \$300,000 Victory Memorial hospital on Memorial Day, just a year after the auspicious laying of the corner stone, is causing the building committee and the hospital association to urge contractors to push their work with all possible speed.

That this is having the desired effect is seen by the fact that the carpenters are just finishing up their work and the plasterers are about through. When both of these contracts are completed it will be possible to rush the final touches. The building committee are confident that two months will see everything completed. This would permit the fixing of Memorial Day as the date of the dedication. Plans are being made to make this one of the biggest affairs of the kind ever held in the city.

In order that the general public may have an opportunity to see what a magnificent, up-to-date hospital has been constructed here, the association will hold open-house for a week following the dedication. During this time no patients will be removed there and the public will have an opportunity to inspect it to their hearts content.

DEDICATE WEST RIDGE SUPERIOR RURAL SCHOOL

Supt. F. G. Blair of Springfield to be Present at Exercises on April 13

The West Ridge school, two miles west of Highland Park, is to be dedicated as a superior rural school by Supt. F. G. Blair of Springfield on Friday night, April 13. Besides the dedication address there will be remarks by Supt. T. A. Simpson of Waukegan, Mr. E. S. Churchill, president of the board of education, Dist. No. 108; vocal selections by Miss Mildred Lund, Evanston; music and readings by Mrs. R. J. Beatty and songs by the school.

West Ridge is one of the three schools in Dist. 108 and has within the last three years met the state requirements of a superior school. The recent acquisition of more playground was the last of the necessary requirements. Lake county has three of the few schools of the state that have been able to reach this high standard.

A few years ago the building was like so many of the rural schools throughout the country, attractive in many ways but so lacking in the comforts and conveniences to which the country children are entitled as well as their city brothers and sisters. There were the old water pail, dipper and wash-basin. Water had to be carried from the neighboring yard. The room was heated by a jacketed stove which occupied one corner of the room and made impossible a comfortable temperature for all the children. The toilets were the usual out-door unsanitary type. There was no way of providing warm noon lunches nor were there conveniences for entertaining the parents in the evening. In fact there were very few community gatherings.

In 1919-1920 the school board enlarged the main room and built an addition to the school which provided a kitchenette, two modern, sanitary toilets, a light airy cloak corridor, and a boiler room with coal storage space. A deep well was drilled, a hot water heating plant installed and a pressure tank provided which makes hot and cold running water possible in kitchenette and toilets. A drinking fountain, electric lights and stove, new book and supply cases, an attractive sun-porch, piano and telephone, all add to the comfort, convenience and beauty of the school.

Not only was an improvement brought about in the physical equipment but there was also an uplift achieved in the school and community spirit. The West Ridge Community club was organized and meetings held each month. The school became in reality a community center. Besides carrying on the usual activities, the club has helped to pay for the piano, it has purchased a victrola and a playground slide, and provided interior furnishings which help make the school home-like and beautiful. At a harvest-home festival last fall, farm and garden products, canned fruits and vegetables, and poultry were exhibited. The present officers of the club are as follows: president, Mrs. D. M. Blasler; vice president, Mrs. William Krumbach; secretary, Marjorie Ludwig; treasurer, Mr. W. Scheskie.

The school work itself is carried on by Miss N. Grace Wright whose experience and training enables her to carry on the work in the spirit of the modern school. Interest in music, art, hand-work, literature and current affairs bring a variety of experiences to the children which will influence their lives for better citizenship and better living. The health and physical welfare of the children is supervised by the school nurse, Miss Emily Brymer.

The state and nation have been striving especially since the last great war for equal educational opportunity for all the children. There has been

A lot of new people are finding Grace church. The Epworth League is preparing the way for a musical entertainment, full particulars of which will be announced Sunday.

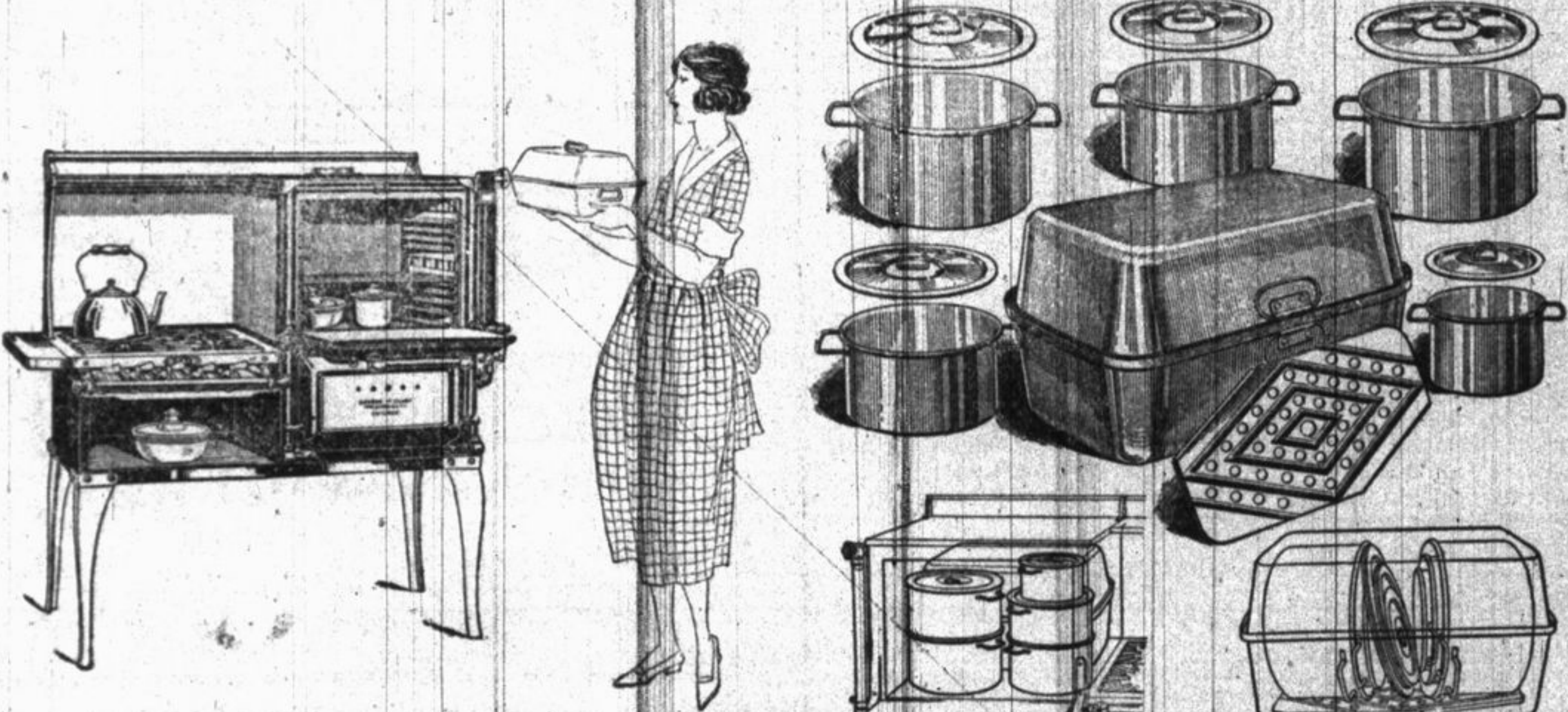
