NORTH SHORE BOYS TO HIKE IN EUROPE

Ten Weeks Tour for High School Lads Planned by Northwestern Head

A ten weeks' hiking tour of Europe for North Shore high school boys has been arranged by Prof. Elmer E. Jones, head of the department of education at Northwestern university. The lads will leave Chicago for the Atlantic coast about June 22nd, and will arrive home during the first week in September.

The actual conduct of the trip will be in the hands of Bob Townley, a Northwestern alumnus and star athlete; Leroy Vernon, a senior at Northwestern university, and Rhys Thackwell, a former Chicago Tribune correspondent who during the World War became thoroughly acquainted with the battlefields of Europe.

Prof. Jones may get in touch with hikers in Switzerland for a short time, but for the most part will be occupied in educational research during the summer. When a student in Germany, Prof. Jones didn't have the means to travel in luxury and so he spent his vacation exploring the scenic wonders of central Europe afoot.

Between twenty and thirty boys of high school age will compose the group. The boys will arrive in Liverpool about July 1st, and will see the sights of London, before visiting the battlefields of Europe. Their hikes will take them through Italy, Switzerland and Germany.

EXEMPT SECURITIES HIT BY RESOLUTION

Move in State Legislature to Ask Congress to Halt System

The Illinois general assembly is asked to urge congress to stop the issuance of tax exempt securities, in a resolution introduced by State Senator Richard Meents.

"It is generally recognized," states the resolution, "that the exemption of the income from billions of dollars of securities from taxation have provided an avenue of escape from taxation to those who desire to invest in such securities."

"If this plan of exemption from taxation is to be continued, the result will be that the burdens will fall most heavily on productive capital and relieve non-productive capital from its fair share of taxation."

The resolution urged congress to pass the resolution providing for an amendment to the United States constitution, prohibiting the further issuance of tax exempt securities.

BILL TO REGULATE FLYING IN STATE

OFFERED IN LEGISLATURE

Senator Jewell of Lewiston is Author of This Measure; Killing of Game Is Penalized

In the first aeronautics bill ever introduced in the Illinois legislature, Senator Jewell of Lewiston proposes several regulations for aircraft.

Ownership of the space above the lands and waters of the state is declared to be vested in the owners of the surface beneath.

Flight would be lawful unless at such a low altitude as to interfere with the use of the land or water or space by the owner, or unless dangerous to persons and property.

The owner and leasee of every aircraft are made liable for injuries to persons and property beneath.

One provision reads: "All contractual and other legal relations entered into by aeronauts or passengers while in flight shall have the same effect as if entered into on the land beneath."

A maximum fine of \$1,000 or imprisonment of not more than sixty days or both, is provided as a penalty for trick flying over a thickly inhabited area, or flying at such a low level as to endanger human life.

Killing of birds or animals while the killer is in flight also is penalized.

PROPOSED NEW ROAD HERE IS EXPECTED

Route Planned Between Barrington and Lake Forest, by Way of Highwood

Laying out of a new highway connecting Lake Forest and Barrington, and providing for an additional route from Lake Forest through Highwood is one of the newest plans of the state highway department, and Chas. E. Russell, county superintendent of highways and C. N. Lamb, district state highway engineer, went over the proposed route last week for the purpose of making recommendations to the state highway department.

Supt. Russell is of the opinion that the new road should run parallel with the Chicago & Northwestern railroad through Highwood and to Lake Forest, as this would relieve the congestion of traffic which now exists on Waukegan road.

Engineer Lamb did not express what recommendations he intends to make to the state highway department.

The remainder of the route is from a point south of Highwood running through Half Day to Barrington.

MISS LATHROP IS NEW COUNTY NURSE

Waukegan Woman Is Appointed by County Tuberculosis Association

Miss Beryl Lathrop, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Lathrop, 139 McKinley avenue, Waukegan, has been appointed to the position of county nurse. Miss Lathrop received the appointment Monday from the Lake County Tuberculosis society and will assume her duties actively on April 1. The society has purchased an automobile which will enable Miss Lathrop to carry on her work in all parts of the county. It is expected that by the first of April the roads will be in such shape that few delays will be encountered.

The work of the new county nurse will take her into the rural districts particularly. She will carry on a missionary work in an effort to stamp out the white plague. The expense of maintaining a county nurse is met from a fund that was raised last year by the sale of Christmas seals.

STATE TO HAVE THE LARGEST FAIR AREA

Plans Purchase of 208 Acres to Be Added to Present Fairground

By the purchase of an adjoining 208 acres of land the state fair advisory board, the board which governs the affairs of the state fair, states that Illinois will have the largest fair grounds in the United States. The purchase would give the state fair grounds here a total space of 346 acres! Minnesota with 260 acres has the largest acreage at present.

After consulting with Governor Small the board adopted a resolution requesting Col. Cornelius Miller director of the state department of public works and buildings to purchase the additional acreage. The ground will cost \$99,500 which is within the appropriation of \$100,000 made for its purchase by the general assembly.

Tentative plans for a dome building to be used as an administration building and for a large building in which to house the automobile exhibits are being made by Edgar L. Martin, supervising architect of Illinois. The automobile exposition building will be erected on the site of the old dome building, which was used as the administration building and which was destroyed by fire sev-

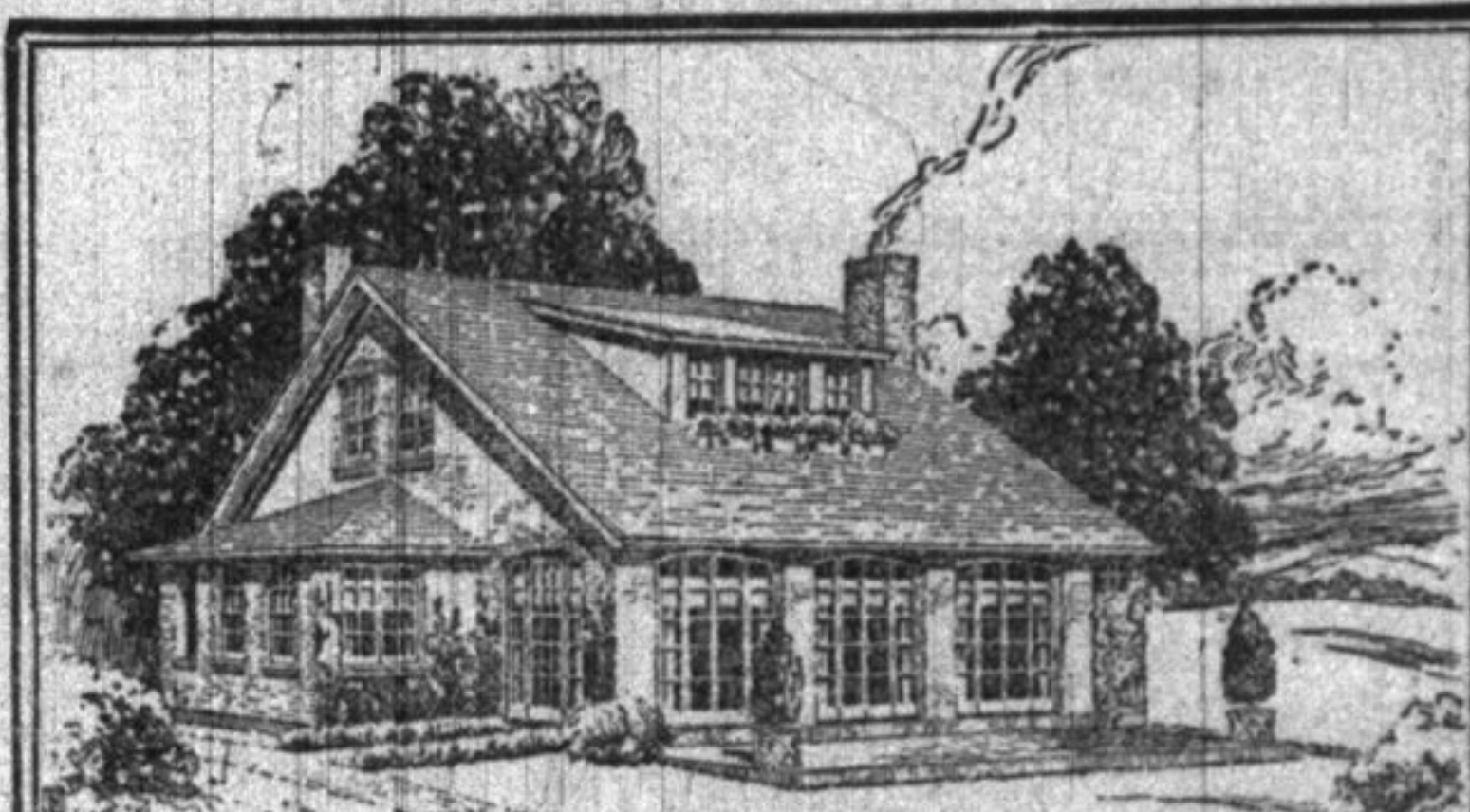
