ELM PLACE SCHOOL

Arbor Day exercises at Elm Place have been postponed until after the Spring vacation which is to be the last week in April. This will not be too late for planting trees and shrubs in this area, especially since the present season is so much retarded. As is the annual custom at Elm Place the pupils have been making up lists of trees and bushes for planting at home and these are being ordered from a reliable nursery. Stock is sold at actual cost. Work of this kind done in past years made a fine showing last summer when peach, pear, cherry, plum and even apple trees were in bearing from nursery stock bought at the school. At one home 92 quarts of peaches were put up from two trees obtained at school and the fruit eaten while fresh about equalled that preserved. This is only one of a number of illustrations. It would seem that the school and the home can perform a very important service by encouraging each child to plant for the future in this way.

MODERN HOTEL ON OLD ACADEMY SITE

Reports in real estate circles are to the effect that on Monday the campus and buildings of the old Highland Park Military academy were sold for \$50,000 and that a modern four-story hotel is to be erected on the property, if present plans are carried out. The report is that O. B. Von Linde bought the property from Col. R. P. Davidson, head of the military academy, which moved to Lake Geneva a few years ago, for a syndicate of which he is a member.

The property fronts 588 feet on Ravine avenue, 327 feet on St. John's avenue, and 297 on Linden. The only two buildings remaining on the campus for servants' quarters and for service uses. Tentative plans call for a \$100,000 hotel structure.
