SECRET OF COLORS IN TUT'S DAY LOST

EXCELLED MODERN PAINTS

College Professor Discussing Civilization of Ancient Egypt Says Period of Transition

Civilization excelling in a few respects that of today is revealed in the tomb of King Tut-ank-amen and other Egyptian excavations, according to Prof. Frederick C. Eiselen, professor of Biblical literature at Northwestern university who spoke to the Business Women's club of the First Methodist Church at Evanston, last (Monday) night, (March 26).

Prof. Eiselen referred especially to the paintings and colorings found in the tombs.

No Colors Equal

"We know of no paints and colors today that would last so long. Thus far we have been unable to learn the secret of the Egyptian methods, although it is possible that we may sometime," he said.

"The civilization of Egypt in the days of King Tut-ank-amen is especially interesting because it represents a transition period, when by reason of spiritual influences many customs and conventions were changing."

Few Changes

Material in the excavations does not indicate a passing rapidly from one-fad to another, a characteristic that appears to be almost exclusively American, Dean Eiselen added. Today's changes of style and architecture are determined by economic conditions. The wealthy American people are able, he said, to adopt each new fancy and discard it as soon as another appears. In old Egyptian days the conventions of the lower classes were well-defined and changed very little. Such changes as were made were the result of religious forces. Most of the building was for the improvement and beautification of temples. Whereas the religious influence was dominant in all activities of life then, the economic is strongest today.

Not Adopting Styles

Commenting on reports from Paris that French women were not adopting dresses and materials, figured with designs from King Tut's tomb, Mr. Eiselen said. "In that respect the European women are more sensible than the Americans. However, the Egyptian creations cannot be more hideous than some of the creations that the American women already have copied from Europe."

MORE PRODUCTION OF GASOLINE, PLAN

SUBSTITUTE IS UNLIKELY

Expert Says New Substance Not Probable, but Development Can Be Extended; Says No "Dollar" Gas

"It is not probable that some hitherto unknown substance will be discovered as a substitute for gasoline." This is the opinion of W. Lee Lewis, professor of chemistry at Northwestern university and inventor of "Lewisite."

More Production Is Aim

"The attention of scientific men and of the industries is being directed rather toward extracting more gasoline from crude petroleum and the utilization of low grade sources such as the oil-bearing shales and sandstones," said Prof. Lewis. "Rapid progress is being made along the first line, i. e. in the development of so-called 'cracking processes' which the yield of gasoline from crude petroleum. I think there is great promise in the so called aluminum chloride process. If one distills ten gallons of kerosene with aluminum chloride he obtains some six or seven gallons of gasoline. The difficulty is at present to recover the aluminum chloride so it may be used over again. Chemists will, however, solve that problem soon."

Oil-Bearing Shales

"Oil-bearing shales are already being utilized for gasoline and if the price goes up will become an important industrial source."

As for the prediction of the \$1.00 gasoline recently made in congress by Senator LaFollette, don't scrap your Ford yet," Prof. Lewis advised. "When a congressman gets scientific he's like Polyhemus in love! When the price passes 40 or 50 cents per gallon, alcohol, which can be made now for 25 cents per gallon can be used. The 18th amendment didn't cover automobiles."

Lines of Progress

"These are the lines of progress—better yields from present petroleum sources, utilization of low grade sources, utilization of low grade sources such as shales, better carburetors and less wasteful engines, and finally, if it comes to cases, a switching to known combustibles such as alcohol. I can't conceive of any miraculous solution outside of the above lines."

LAY IN WINTER COAL IN SUMMER, ADVICE OF FUEL DISTRIBUTOR

Washington, D. C., March 27. — Coal consumers were advised today by F. R. Wadleigh, federal fuel distributor, to make plans to buy their winter fuel during the spring and summer. Retail dealers were asked to facilitate such steps, in order to increase public assurance against any difficulties in labor or transportation next winter.

Householders who do this, Mr. Wadleigh said, will likely get better grades of coal, and in addition will help industrial conditions by keeping mines busy in the summer, and assisting railroads to move freight in the most economic manner.

A study is now being made of the possibilities in community or town storage plans, Mr. Wadleigh continued, but the matter is not expected to be ready this year. Individual consumers, he said, consequently will have to provide their own methods.

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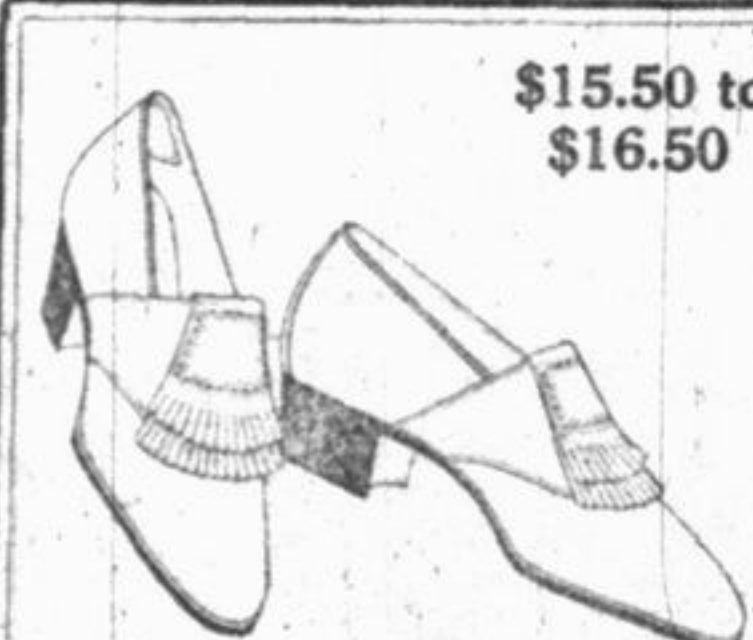
