URGES INVESTORS BUY "BABY BONDS"

Postmaster Advises Those Who Cash Liberty Bonds To Reinvest

April 16 was a big "pay day" for the world's greatest banker. On that day Uncle Sam turned over \$125,000,000 to holders of Fourth Liberty Bonds. Illinois' slice of this "melon" amounted to about \$8,000,000. Postmaster Schneider of Highland Park urges holders of these bonds to clip their coupons promptly and to re-invest their interest in the new U. S. "Baby Bonds" which he is now selling at \$20.80 each and which will be worth \$25 each in five years (an increase of about 22 per cent). Under the government's monthly investment plan, if a person buys one of these Baby Bonds every month he will own sixty at the end of five years, the maturity value of which is \$1500.

Many Visit Couple Sunday, at Celebration of Golden Wedding

On Sunday, April 15th, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar F. Bell, 397 North ave., celebrated their golden wedding. A host of friends and twenty-eight members of the family, children and grandchildren, were guests of the home throughout the day and evening. The floral offerings and gifts were notable for their profusion, beauty and richness.

This affair was the climax of an event which took place in Dayton, Ohio, April 17, 1873, when Oscar F. Bell and Wilhelmina E. Mayer were united in marriage.

In 1878 they moved to Evanston where they lived three years, then for a year resided in Glencoe moving to the home on North ave., Highland Park, which they now occupy, in 1892.

Ten splendid children, four boys and six girls (all of whom are living) blessed this union. They are: John S. SCHOOL ELECTIONS HELD ON SATURDAY

Carr Is Choice for Member of Board in Dist. 108; No Contest in Other Districts

With the exception of a spirited contest in District 108, school elections here last Saturday were quiet affairs. In the 108th district W. C. Shipnes as member, received 417 a total of 440 votes, and D. M. Blasier was re-elected member with 423 votes, for the full term. George W. Carr was elected member for the full term with 267 votes after a hot contest with E. A. Turpin, who received 217 votes. Carl G. Bingham for the unexpired term to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Shipnes as member, received 417 votes. Total vote cast was 482, the largest vote ever recorded in the district.

In District 107 there was no contest. E. B. Metzler was elected president with 28 votes, and Mrs. George Green and George E. Jones for members each received 29 votes.

In the high school election Attorney George T. Rogers of Lake Forest was elected a member of the board for the full term, succeeding Silas Adams of that city, who was not a candidate for re-election. The vote in Highland Park was 34, in Lake Forest 15. The vote in Deerfield was proportional.

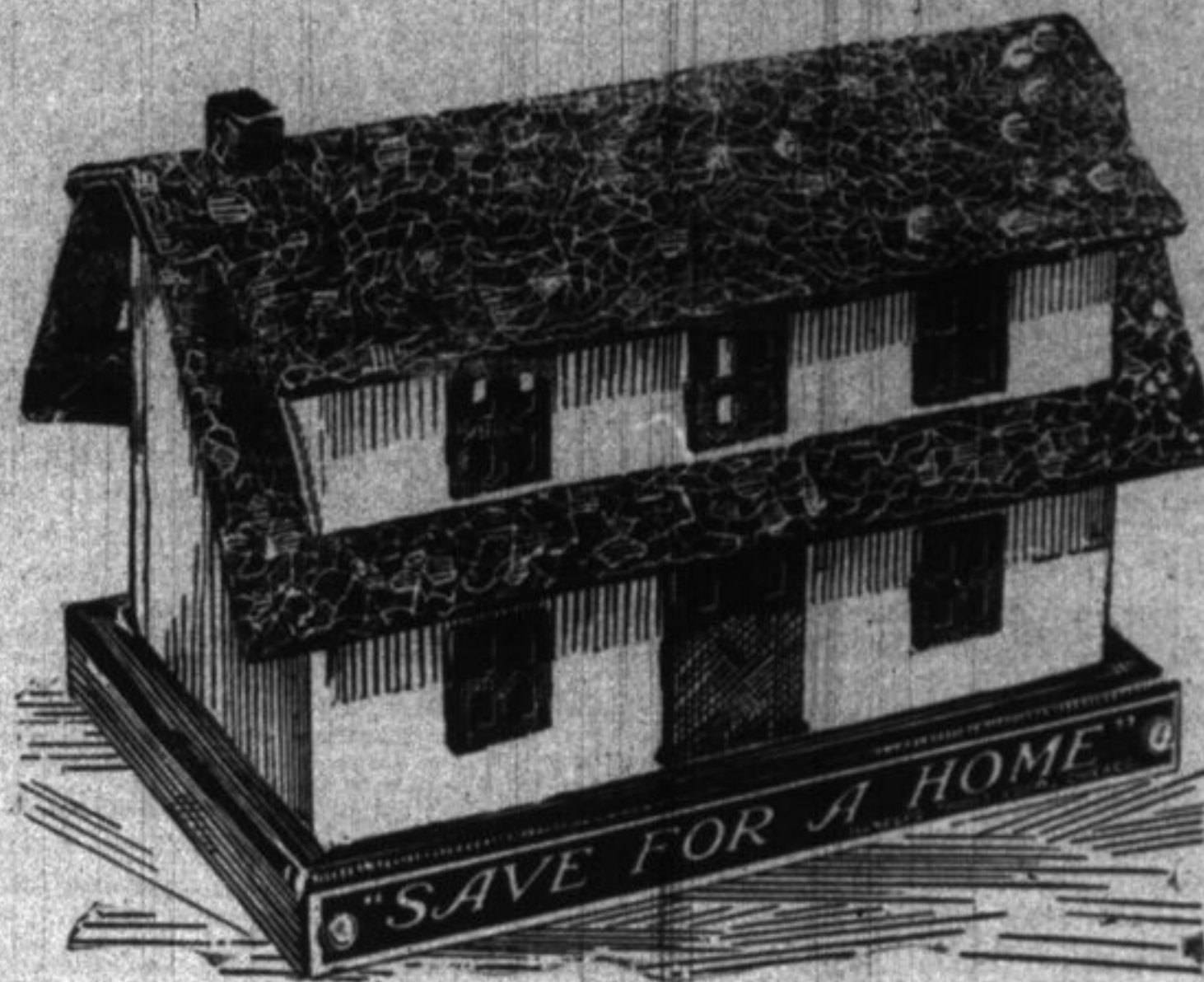
In the election for school trustee, also held Saturday, Walter Cope was re-elected without opposition.

Memorial in St. Mary's Cemetery Receives Final Touches; Adds to Beauty

With the placing of a very fine figure which was imported from Italy, received and installed last week, on the new Sherwin mausoleum, another excellent work of art was added to the beautiful memorials in the Lake Forest cemetery.

The material used was Mount Airy granite which is said to be the whitest in color and otherwise peculiarly adapted to the building of mausoleums.

In keeping with the great level of public taste in America, which has been constantly advancing, and elevating the public, the new mauso-

leum recently erected in St. Mary's cemetery, Lake Forest, by Collins and Doane company of Waukegan and Libertyville, is well constructed and beautifully designed.

DURST IS ELECTED MAYOR OF WAUKEGAN

By a majority of 384 votes, the vote being 3743 to 3359, voters of the city of Waukegan on Tuesday elected Theodore H. Durst, president of the Security Savings bank of Waukegan as mayor of Waukegan for the coming four years.
