DEERFIELD NEWS

The election held last Tuesday was one of the two most exciting village elections ever held in Deerfield. The other was held April 17, 1917, when Mr. W. A. Whiting was elected president by about ten votes. In last week's election Lincoln Pettis won by nine votes.

The following are the successful candidates:

President, Lincoln Pettis; clerk, Chester Wessling; police magistrate, William Steffes; trustees, Thilo Toll, Arthur Ender, William Osterman.

Lincoln Pettis was born in Deerfield and has lived here for forty-five years. He is well known for his untiring efforts to further the interest of Deerfield during his service as a member of the board of trustees. He has also served as fire marshal, and is a member of the Brier Gate Golf club.

Chester Wessling was born and raised within five miles of Deerfield and is 41 years of age. He was a bookkeeper and correspondent for the Stanley Works of Chicago, manufacturers of builders hardware. For three years he was employed in the hardware and implement business at Manhattan, Ill., and has been in the hardware business in Deerfield for three years.

Arthur Ender is 45 years old, and the son of the late John C. Ender a former president of the village. Mr. Ender was postmaster of the village for eight years, but resigned last July because of ill health. He is president of the Deerfield State bank.

Thilo H. Toll came to Deerfield two years ago when his son and daughter, Mrs. C. E. Sheridan, located and built on the old Vetter homestead.

Mr. Toll, who is 57 years of age, has been in the building and contracting business all his life with the exception of serving the city of Chicago as inspector of the construction of sewers for eight years, and for ten years as inspector of buildings for the municipality.

He has done quite an extensive business as general contractor in Chicago and makes mason-brick and concrete work his specialty.

William Steffes, who is 53 years of age was born and raised in Minnesota. Mr. and Mrs. Steffes moved to Deerfield nine years ago from Milwaukee. Mr. Steffes is in the fire insurance business. He owns a car, is a careful driver, and is well qualified for the position of police magistrate.

William Osterman was born and raised in Deerfield, moving to Chicago when he reached manhood, when he served upon the police force for years until he received his pension, moving back to Deerfield last October.

A few words must be said about Mr. B. H. Kress, the retiring president, who has served this town so faithfully for the past fifteen years. Mr. Kress was on the school board at the time of the erection of the new grammar school and it was largely due to his untiring efforts that we have such a splendid building. He was also a village trustee and served two terms as president of Deerfield.
