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**TYPEWRITER GREAT AID TO BUSINESS**

**Brief History of Invention and Its Influence on Modern Trade Methods**

It is almost impossible to point to an invention which has been of greater use in the business world than the typewriter.

Christopher Latham Sholes was the father of the typewriter, for it was in 1867 that he produced the first crude machine. Sholes, a native of Milwaukee, was a man of considerable abilities, and had won fame with a number of inventions before he evolved the typewriter. At various times he had been printer, editor, newspaper publisher, postmaster, and a member of the legislature.

Sholes edited a newspaper the office of which was above the Milwaukee telegraph office. One day he went into the telegraph office and asked the chief operator for a sheet of carbon paper.

In those days carbon paper was a curiosity, and when the operator asked what he wanted it for, Sholes replied, mysteriously: "Come to my office tomorrow at noon and I'll show you."

The next day, at the appointed time, the telegraph operator went upstairs. There he found Sholes displaying a strange contrivance, which comprised pieces of pine board, an old telegraph key, a sheet of glass, and other odds and ends.

Taking his borrowed sheet of carbon and a thin sheet of white paper, Sholes slipped them into the machine against the piece of glass. Moving the paper slowly with one hand, he tapped the telegraph key with the other. On the end of the telegraph key was the letter "w" cut in brass.

Sholes's device was a "writing machine." It wrote only the one letter over and over again, but the inventor was on the right track. After some months of experimenting he produced the first typewriter. On this machine the keyboard was like that of a piano, but otherwise it bore a close resemblance to the typewriters of today.
