Christopher Latham Sholes was the father of the typewriter, for it was in 1867 that he produced the first crude machine. Sholes, a native of Milwaukee, was a man of consider-able abilities, and had won fame with a number of inventions before he evolved the typewriter. At various times he had been printer, editor, newspaper publisher, postmaster, and a member of the legislature.
