There are now eighteen counties with such organizations, with a total membership of twelve thousand. In order that home bureau may carry on its work effectively, it is necessary that it obtain the services of a trained worker, experienced in home economics, known as the home adviser. The ideal sought is to have every home economically sound, mechanically convenient, physically healthful, morally wholesome, artistically satisfying, mentally stimulating, socially responsible, spiritually inspiring, and founded upon mutual affection and respect. No other rural organization can surpass the home bureau, which is a solution of the complex and varied problems of home-making for the farm women.
