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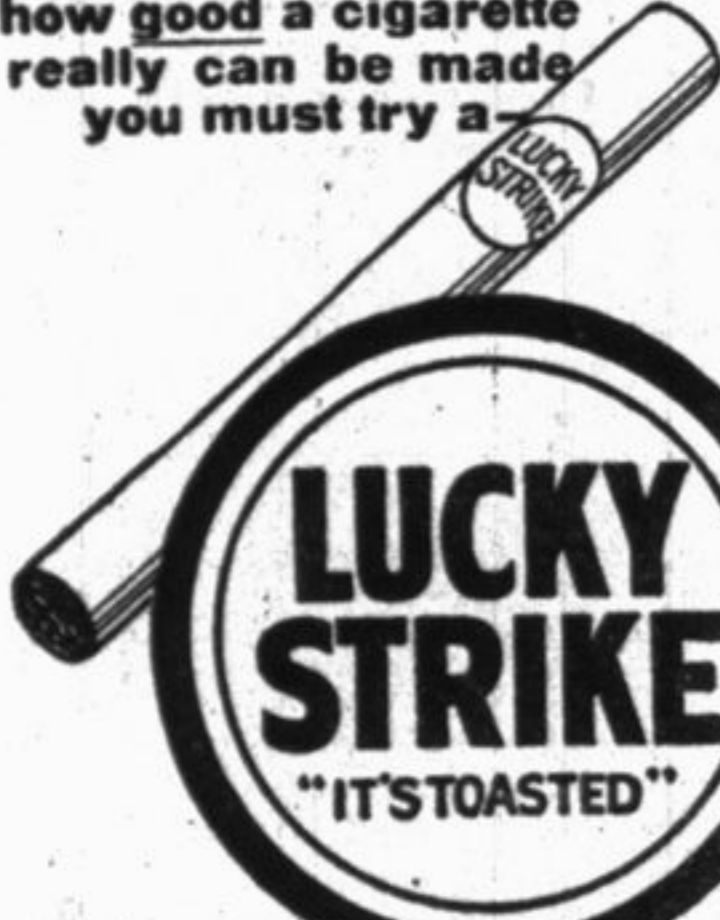
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### SOCIAL ACTIVITY

Representatives of the Ridge, Everett, Wilmette and Deerfield school districts attended a meeting last Friday afternoon at the Wilmette school, at which Miss Kathryn Van Aken, assistant state leader of Home Economics Extension work, spoke upon the advantages of organizing a home bureau in Lake county. There are now eighteen counties with such organizations, with a total membership of twelve thousand. In order that a home bureau may carry on its work effectively, it is necessary that it obtain the services of a trained worker, experienced in home economics, known as the home adviser. The aim of the home bureau is to provide for the women of the county a means of adding to their knowledge, improving their appreciations, and increasing their skill as home-makers. The ideal sought is to have every home economically sound, mechanically convenient, physically healthful, morally wholesome, artistically satisfying, mentally stimulating, socially responsible, spiritually inspiring, and founded upon mutual affection and respect. No other rural organization can surpass the home bureau, which is a solution of the complex and varied problems of home-making for the farm women.

To provide a state school fund to equalize as far as possible the opportunities for a good elementary education for every child in the state, to stimulate local effort for better schools, to encourage the employment of better trained teachers, and to provide opportunities for young men and women to secure better training for teaching, senate bill 220 deserves your consideration and the support of your state senator and representatives.

The principal factors of the bill are teaching service, the trained teacher and pupil attendance.

Each district has within itself the motive for and incentive to educational improvement, and for which the state will offer a reward.

One of the provisions of the bill is that the state shall pay to teach each district two cents a day for each day that a child is in the elementary school.

Extra money is allotted to schools who employ normal school graduates. The state will give \$1.50 for each week that the teacher is employed. A typical computation for a high valuation, low rate one room school district will provide a gross income for the district of \$1,195. The bill replaces the haphazard antiquated method in the distribution of state aid and will correct one of the fundamental weaknesses in the Illinois system of education.

Mr. Carleton W. Washburne of Winnetka will furnish you with a bulletin explaining the bill in detail if you are interested in it. The U. S. spends \$2,600,000,000 for war and but \$10,000,000 for education.

The school law provides that a truant officer shall be employed in each county. Lake county does not have one. Rather than permit the children to be out of school Mr. Simpson performs the duty himself, which takes a great deal of his time, which could more profitably be spent in visiting schools.

During the last sixteen years the clerical work of the office of the county superintendent of schools has tripled, but the amount of money allowed Mr. Simpkins for clerk hire is so small that he is compelled to do much of his own office work evenings and on Sunday.

The professional growth of rural school teachers could be encouraged by a system of report cards such as are in use in communities like Oak Park, had the county superintendent the assistance that he needs.

The season is approaching for the annual endurance test, known as "final examinations," in rural schools. Pupils of the eighth grade spend an entire day, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. answering questions on all of the subjects which they have studied during the year.

In civics alone is the principal allowed to give the examination.

Had the superintendent competent assistance the entrance examinations for high school could be spread over a longer time, and would be less fatiguing.

Since the daylight saving time schedule has been adopted the C. M. & St. P. R. R. has advanced the time of the first three morning trains to Chicago five minutes each.
