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**THOUSANDS WILL BE  
AT TRAINING CAMPS**

R. O. T. C. OPENS JUNE 14

Force of 30,000 Regulars Will  
Train More Than 300,000  
Men in Citizens  
Camps Soon

More than 300,000 men will be "under arms" this summer in various army camps, undergoing intensive military instruction, according to estimates compiled today by the war department from reports from commanding officers of the nine corps areas.

They have volunteered largely from civil life and many will "fall in" for the first time as a "rookie" in khaki, subject for the time being to the rules and regulations of the military establishment.

**Regulars to Assist**  
It is estimated by the war department that 232,000 men will attend the national guard, organized reserve officer's training corps and the citizen's military training camps, about 30,000 officers and men of the regular army will assist in the training for instruction and demonstration purposes. The remaining troops of the regular forces have been provided with a program of their own to be followed during the summer at the scattered posts of the country and in Panama, Alaska, and other territorial stations.

The training period will begin in June and extend to October. The national guardsmen will begin taking the field in June and continue through September with each unit allowed two weeks. Their attendance is expected to be about 178,000 officers and men.

**R. O. T. C. Open June 4**  
The majority of the reserve officers training corps units will be in training from June 14 to July 25. Each unit of this organization will be given six weeks' instruction. Their total attendance is estimated at 9,000. The citizen's military training camps will be held from June 25 to Sept. 1, each unit being encamped one month. Provisions have been made to accommodate 30,000 men in this way.

Gen. Pershing has issued letters of invitation to all senators and representatives to visit the various camps and observe what is being accomplished by the training program.

"The instruction will be adapted to the requirements of each of these categories (camps)" the letter says, "and will include not only physical, disciplinary and basic military training, but also talks and lectures and quizzes on good citizenship, its rights, duties, and responsibilities."

**OUTLINE PLANS FOR

Hope to Maintain Annual Event,  
If Libertyville Will Aid  
With Funds

After a four hour discussion of every angle of the Lake county fair situation Tuesday night at the Farm Bureau in Libertyville, the officers and directors last week authorized the following:

If the town of Libertyville will lead off in a substantial way toward paying the debt of some \$5700 the balance will go on and be made doubly attractive.

Some of the changes and program suggested are:

Strictest economy in every item of expense.

Three days instead of five.  
Cut out to a large extent the main reason for the entire debt, horse racing.

Inaugurate the most unique and inexpensive program of amusements of any fair in the United States, which aside from baseball will include a list of events, which will surely prove the best drawing program ever attempted and besides the cost will be very much less than the out of all proportion horse racing program of years past.

With horse racing curtailed more space will be available for the stock show which should be the largest ever had.

**CITY MANAGER PLAN  
MAY SOON BE LEGAL**

City manager form of government for all cities under 500,000 population is provided in a bill introduced in the state senate by Senator Randolph Boyd, of Galva, at the instigation of various chambers of commerce. Any city would be permitted to adopt the new form at an election upon a majority vote.

The bill would remove from the mayor and councilmen all power with the exception of the manager and fixing of his salary. The mayor would be elected for a term of two years and the councilmen would serve four years. Cities of 2,000 to 10,000 would have four councilmen; 10,000 to 25,000, six councilmen and cities from 25,000 to 200,000 population, two additional councilmen for each 25,000 population.

The manager appointed by the council would be the city's executive head. No definite term is fixed for his appointment nor is any salary fixed, these matters being left to the judgment of the mayor and councilmen.

**SHERIDAN ROAD IS  
CONVENTION TOPIC**

Lake County Cities Invited to  
Attend Meeting of Assoc-  
iation in May

The Lake county cities, on Sheridan road have been invited to be represented at the Sheridan road convention to be held at the twin cities of Marinette, Wis., and Moraine, Mich., on May 10. The event will be the annual meeting of the Sheridan road association and also a conference to discuss a co-operative advertising plan between all Sheridan road communities to increase auto tourist traffic.

Cities and other communities from St. Louis to Lake Superior have been invited to send representatives to this convention. In most cases the representatives will be from the business men's associations, while from some towns the Kiwanis, Rotary or other clubs will send several members.

Every community located on the Sheridan road, which is the longest concrete road in the world, has a joint interest in the increase of auto tourist traffic. Under these circumstances it has been suggested that co-operative promotional plans might be worked out through the Sheridan road association to the advantage of all.

**INVENTS PLAN TO  
MEASURE STAR HEAT**

Warmth So Infinitesimal That It  
Won't Boil Thimbleful of  
Water

Should the heat reaching the earth from all the stars in the heavens be collected and concentrated on a thimble full of water, two centuries would be required to bring the liquid to the boiling point.

And yet, in view of this startling statement, Dr. Q. W. Coblenz, of the United States bureau of standards and one of the leading astronomers of the country has perfected a machine for measuring the heat of each star and planet in the heavens.

The thermophile—a heat measuring device—will determine the heat radiation of a star so infinitesimal that a million years would be required for the ray to warm a bit of water the volume of a penny, federal scientists said. The machine will measure the heat of a candle at the distance of a mile.

Astronomers studying the moon said the climate there ranges from 460 below zero at night to considerably over the boiling point during the day. Days are about four weeks long on the moon. The August temperature is reached about three weeks after sun rise.

**MOTOR MATERIALS  
FROM MANY LANDS**

Hundred and Eleven Different  
Things Used in Generator  
Widely Found

From scores of foreign lands and from many states in this country come the 111 materials which are used in the manufacture of an electric motor. These 111 materials must be carried a total of 250,000 miles, on sea and on land, on elephants' and camels' backs and on peons' shoulders before they arrive at the electric manufacturing plants in the United States. Throughout the world, thousands of workers gather the necessary ingredients for making the motors. Many of these workmen are dressed in strange garb, they speak a strange tongue, and many are burned with the tropic sun. They dig in mines, they harvest in fields; they pick, gather and scrape to provide the many materials for building the motors which operate the machinery in the nation's factories and lift the burden of the housewife.

**LOTUS BEDS AGAIN  
GET IN LIMELIGHT**

They're Going to Be Saved to  
Posterity Again; Question  
Is How to Do It

The lotus flower, queen of the Nile and favorite of the Pharaohs, symbol of love in the Bible and ancient minstrel tale, is to be taken under the protection of the law in Wisconsin that they may be preserved in the few spots where they are to be found in that state. No action has been taken as yet by the state of Illinois to preserve the wonderful lotus beds that exist in Grass and Fox lakes in Lake county. No finer lotus beds than these are to be found in any part of the United States and they are equalled only on the Nile itself.

The Wisconsin legislature has passed a bill which provides a fine for picking or destroying these rare flowers of antiquity, and a jail sentence for the second offense.

The painting of the large seed pods produced by these flowers in brilliant colors developed and thousands were sold and can be found in homes over the country as winter decorations. Tons of these seed pods have been shipped from the lotus beds in Lake county and as a result there is fear that before long the beds may be exterminated. For that reason there has been frequent urging that the state do something to prevent such wanton destruction of these beautiful flowers.
