



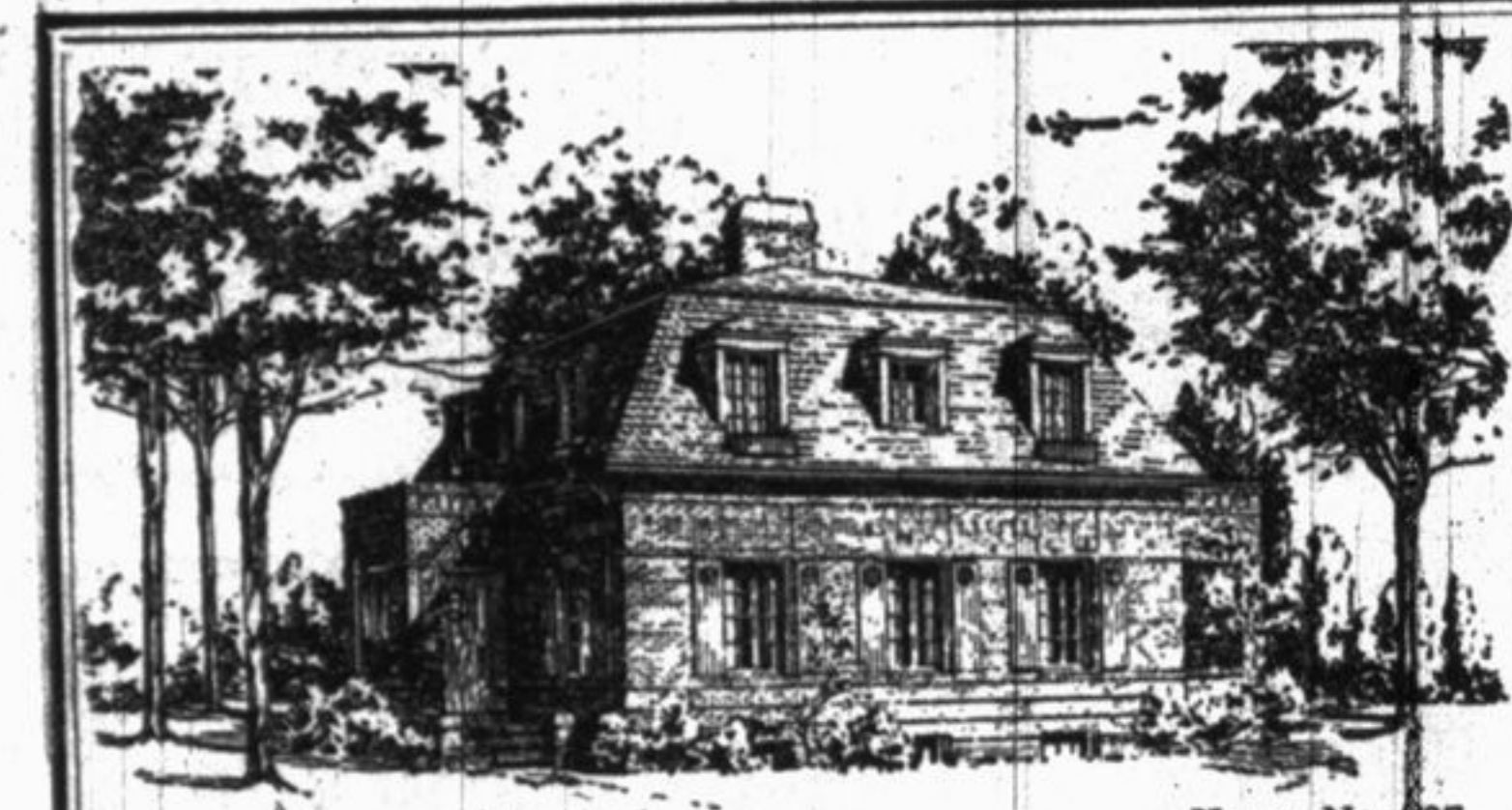

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NEW BOOK BY COBB IS WELL RECEIVED

Many Laudatory Comments Are Heard on Latest Work of This Writer

The public wants a complete autobiography of Irvin S. Cobb, on the basis of his interesting partial account of his life in Stickfuss, declares James Melvin Lee, director of the Department of Journalism of New York University. In a review appearing in the Editor and Publisher, of which he is literary editor, Mr. Lee says:

"A book worth more than a stick of type in Stickfuss by Irvin S. Cobb (George H. Doran Company). Long before Cobb was the highest paid short story writer in America, he had top of column position as one of the best reporters on Park Row.

"Part I of the volume tells how in three takes, Cobb got his jobs on New York newspapers. Part II tells the inside stories of several great interviews. On the theory that 'now the truth can be told' Cobb prints the deleted remarks of Kitchner which had been printed originally, would have provoked even more controversy. His reason for 'killing such significant utterances was that Kitchner would have blue penciled them if an opportunity to read the original draft of the interview had been afforded.' From a practical point of view, the distinct contribution of the book is Cobb's opinion of the news value of scoops and beats. A good take from the book is the chapter entitled 'Leaves Out of My Thrill-Book.'

"If Cobb published this book as a query to the public whether it wanted a complete biography, the answer can safely be sent by wireless. 'Send full story.'"

CATCH TWO ALLEGED DESERTER-BANDITS

Men Who Escaped From Fort Sheridan; Are Charged With Robbery

Two deserters, who escaped from Fort Sheridan two weeks ago, one of them a guard, have been captured, it was reported at Sheriff Ahlstrom's office Friday of last week.

Julius Schmalz, aged 19, and the guard, James Brown, were seized in Chicago, and have been taken back to Fort Sheridan to stand court martial. They escaped with two others. The three men and the guard left the post the day General Pershing was a visitor there. That night three stores in Lake Bluff were robbed of clothing and two army uniforms were discarded in the Hymen Kading store, the robbers taking several suits of civilian clothing. The Fort Sheridan officers are investigating the robberies in an effort to find out if they were committed by the deserters.

The other two stores that were entered are Rosenthal & Helming, and a shoe repair shop.

The two soldiers still at large are Wm. C. Koelman, 18, and Harry Freeland, 22.

AN ORDINANCE

To Establish Official time in the City of Highland Park and Accomplish Daylight Saving Thereby, After April 29th, A. D. 1923.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

SECTION 1. Central standard time shall, from and after April 29th,

A. D. 1923, be the official time within the City of Highland Park for the transaction of all City business; except that from 12:00 noon, on the last Sunday in April in the year 1923 and every year thereafter; official time for the City of Highland Park shall be advanced one hour, and at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in September of the year 1923 and every year thereafter, such official time shall, by the retarding of one hour, be returned to Central standard time; and all legal or official proceedings of the Council and all official business of the City shall be regulated thereby; and when, by ordinance, resolution, or action of any municipal officer or body, an act must be performed at or within a prescribed time, it shall be so performed according to such official time.

SECTION 2. All clocks or other timepieces in or upon public buildings or other premises maintained at the expense of the City of Highland Park shall be set and run according to the official time as provided in Section 1 hereof, and it is hereby made the duty of the officer or person having control and charge of such building or buildings and premises to see that the said clocks or other timepieces are set and run in accordance with the official time as provided by this ordinance.

SECTION 3. All persons residing within the City and all persons, firms, or corporations doing business within the city are hereby requested to set and run any and all clocks or other timepieces under their control within the City in accordance with the official time as provided by Section 1 of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the construction of a connected system of water mains in St. Johns Avenue from Cedar Avenue to Comstock Place and in Comstock Place from St. Johns Avenue to Kincaid Street, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

Said bids will be received by the Council at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, until 5:00 o'clock p.m. on the 11th day of May, 1923, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall of said City.

The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum.

The successful bidder for the construction of said improvement will be required to enter into bond in a sum equal to one-third of the amount of his or their bid with sureties to be approved by the President of the Council when entering into the contract for the construction of said improvement.

All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the President of the Council of the City of Highland Park for the sum of not less than ten (10) per cent of the aggregate of the proposal.

Said proposal must be delivered to the President of the Council in open session of said Council at the time and place fixed herein for the opening of the same.

No proposal of bid will be considered unless accompanied by check herein provided.

The Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids if they deem it best for the public good.

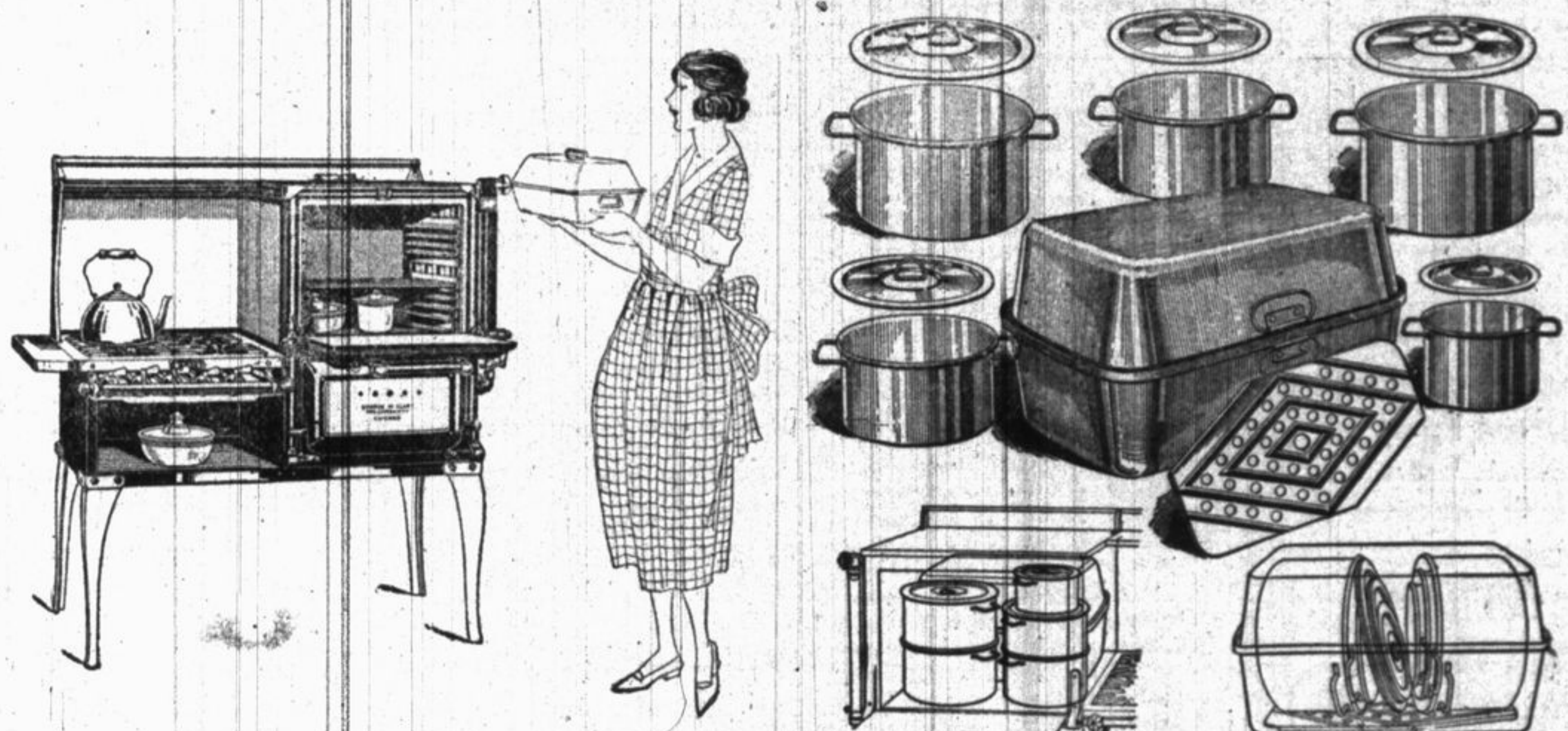
